PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Sir—Mr. Whear in Monday's Guardian states: "It has been erroneously stated that the Mayor is similar to the position of Speaker in the Legislature. Not so."

I am sure that even those who disagree with some of his arguments are appreciative of his interest in civic affairs, and welcome those criticisms as beneficial in turning the searchlight into shadowy recesses. We cannot be all of one mind, and a conflict of viewpoints by the law of friction produces light.

Mr. Whear touches on the School question. It badly needs lifting. Not merely and exclusively its financial phase, but also its economic needs. He made some efforts to improve control, but how would it be if his talents were diverted to some of the details for improvement? We have by the want of foresight in the last century our leading public school located at an extreme end of the City. Small children from 6 to 12 years compelled to travel, in such a winter as that from the railway station and east of Cumberland Street or Longworth Avenue almost a mile to school. Is there neither horse sense nor shame in the eyes of the engineers of this monarchy?

Not many years ago a \$20,000 annex was added to this western folly. A small sum added to this or perhaps for the same cost an auxiliary juvenile school might have been erected near the P. of W. College. Removal of the younger scholars from West Kent to a home school at the East would have left ample accommodation without cost of the new wing, and the surplus teachers could also have been placed in the Eastern classes. Even now the demand for a change may force the Council to take the matter in hand. Of course there will arise that eternal drawback that the spender and the grafter will manoeuvre for an elaborate building program, and the salary list paiders busy on the job to aid their friends to an already overcrowded pay roll. It will be the practical economist who will reorganise or reconstruct the system into the environment of common sense. Are there no spare rooms in the new college that might not be available? It is a problem demanding attention.

I fully concur with Councillor Whear: "If there is to be economy let it be practised in every branch of the service." With the addenda, there must be economy.
