**Indian Family Seen Joint Heirs In Estate**

FREDERICTON, Dec. 14—(CP)—Search is being made in New Brunswick, as well as other parts of Canada, for an Indian woman and her children, believed joint heirs to an estate valued at between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

B. Lee McCutcheon, district Indian agent, said he had reason to believe the woman's husband, Wellington Tracy, was a native of Sunbury County, N. B. It is believed that Tracy died leaving the estate to which his wife and children fell heir.

According to information received by McCutcheon, the couple were married in Alaska about 50 years ago. They settled in Western Canada but separated a few years later.

The search was instigated by a Boston research firm.

## Canadiens Cut Short Losing Streak By 5-3 Victory Over Amerks

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens cut short a two-game losing streak and put an end to a similar winning streak for Americans by scoring two goals in overtime tonight to defeat the New York squad 5-3 in a National Hockey League game before 5,000 fans.

The extra-session goals went to Louis Trudel and Charlie Sands with the former scoring on a long shot, that goalie Earl Robertson didn't see and the latter firing home the puck with only three seconds to go on a break-away from a New York gang attack.

Before that, the Americans, with the veteran Neil Stewart sparking their drive, had climbed back from a 3-0 deficit to draw even midway through the final period. Stewart scored the goal that made the score 3-3 and this tally, coupled with an assist, picked up on a first period score by Charlie Conacher, gave him a record of an even 500 points in regular N. H. L. competition.

It was Stewart's 319th goal and his 18th assist in the big time, although this does not include either goals or assists that the fellow has marked up in playoff games during his 14 years of N. H. L. play.

Canadiens appeared to have the game packed away when Ray Gettiffe went through for two great goals in the first period on a play engineered by Marty Barry and then Johnny Gagnon made it 3-0 with only 30 seconds left of the opening frame.

But 14 seconds after Gagnon got his goal, Conacher pushed through for Americans' first goal. In the third period, Conacher pushed through Americans' leading scorer, slammed home his seventh goal of the season and less than two minutes later Stewart evened matters with a typical Stewart tally—flipping in the puck while standing just outside the goal crease.

Then came the overtime lapse by Robertson who had kept Americans in the game by his remarkable goalkeeping. He couldn't do anything about the fifth tally as all his men were up the ice as Mantha, and Sands broke alone and Sands made the last pass good.

## Bruins And Leafs Divide Points In Tie

TORONTO, Dec. 14—(CP)—Boston Bruins and Toronto Leafs divided points in a National Hockey League game tonight that ended in a 1-1 overtime tie and both teams remained dead-locked for first place in the current race.

The weakened visitors picked up a fluke goal in the first period on Porky Dumart's shot and held their lead until shortly after the third session got underway when Syl Apps leveled the score with an unusual brilliant effort. From then on the teams tried only spasmodically to break the deadlock.

Dumart's goal was the only exciting incident of a dull first period. The clever Boston winger fired from centre ice, the puck rebounding off the back boards and curling along the goal-post into the net. Turk Broda tried to sweep the puck into the corner but it hopped over his stick.

Apps traversed a rocky road in obtaining his marker. He was tripped by two of the Bruins and bounced by a third but remained on one skate as he glided in to beat Frankie Brimsek with a flip, forehead shot.

Bruins, minus the services of the sharp-shooting Roy Conacher whose wrist is broken, lost Mel Hill at the start of the second when he developed a charity horse. Flash Hollett rolled on both the defence and the forward line for the remaining part of the game.

The crowd of 9,684, was the smallest of the season.
