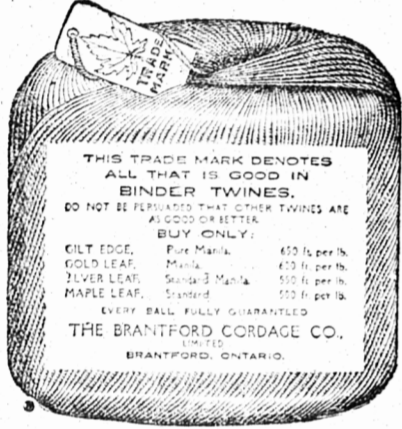

ANCHORS LOSE FIRST GAME OF PLAY-OFF SERIES

To Stars Who Win By Score of 7 to 4

Battling stubbornly against an avaranche of errors which seemed to be the prevailing epidemic in the Anchor stronghold last evening, the Stars notwithstanding, worked with machine like precision and playing ball as they never played before set the former back 7 to 4 in the first of a series of best two out of three games for the City League baseball championship.

In spite of a cold north-west wind which swept the diamond and bleachers, a fair quota of custom were on hand to witness the opening of hostilities. The game although raged in spots was none the less exciting, especially in the third inning when the Anchors made a bold bid for a life, but expert fielding coupled with excellent hurling by McQuaid turned the advantage in spite of bitter offences.

The west end aggregation looked ed anything like a winning ball machine last evening, while the Stars on the other hand played appropriate to the name; the entire outfit were a credit to the district they represent.

It was a well earned win for McQuaid who mounded throughout in great style, his delivery being somewhat changed from that used in previous games. McFarlane, the hero of last Monday's game, starting on the salt once more suffered a set-back, but not through faulty pitching. The Stars connected with the horsehide in the second for two hits, but three costly errors on the part of the infield forced him to the bench with four runs chalked up behind him. He was replaced by Hobbs who although going in cold, hurled brilliantly to be credited with a loss.

His Honor Lieut. Governor Hertz after being absent for the past three games due to other important engagements was an interested spectator at last night's fixture.

"Whacker" McEachern and "Chick" Williams helped to speed the game up somewhat. McEachern chased the foul balls, while Williams handled the score board. The next game of the series will be played next Tuesday night.

Many spectators expressed the opinion last evening that the game should have gone nine innings, at least eight.

Game by Innings

First Inning, Stars—McCarey leading, fouls the first offering by McFarlane, second two are the grounds out to "Dutchy" Diamond at first. Bill Ryan following also fouls the first pitched ball, then singling to right. Bulger ground bingles out to McFarlane, Ryan going to second. Lynds batting fourth bingles along third base for a hit and stealing second on first pitched ball to McQuaid next batter; Ryan on third. McQuaid grounds out Saunders, ending a close squeeze on a count. No score.

Anchors—McQuaid leading is struck out by McQuaid, hurling for the Stars. "Dempsey" Diamond hit hard but is thrown out by McQuaid on a hot ground ball. "Dutchy" Diamond fans out retiring the side. No scoring.

Second Inning—Stan Ryan batting drives a fast ball through Diamond at second, arriving on the latter's error. Martin is safe on Saunders' error. The Stars start a batting rally. McCabe fills the bases on "Dutchy" Diamond's error. Bases full. Prowse batting fans out on high balls. McCabe a dangerous batter follows Prowse singling to centre scoring Stan Ryan and Martin. Bill Ryan grounds to Saunders scoring McCabe. Ryan beats out ball and is safe on the throw to the plate. Bulger grounds out to McFarlane scoring McCarey. Lynds ends the big rally grounding out to Dempsey Diamond at second. Score, Stars 4; Anchors 0.

Prowse goes to first on a third dropped strike; Ryan pulling the throw from Francis is out on the path. McCarey goes down on a third dropped strike. McCarey safe on a low throw. Martin scoring on the play. Bill Ryan flies to right field giving Dempsey Diamond a chance to make the best running catch of the game. He was going at full side speed on the play.

Anchors—O'Leary grounds out to Ryan. Campbell strikes out on a fast shot on the inside Hobbs batting for McFarlane grounds out to McQuaid.

Fourth Inning, Stars—Hobbs replaces McFarlane on the mound. Bulger batting drives a fast one at McQuaid who knocks the chance down and throws him out. Lynds flies out to McQuaid. McQuaid flies out to Dempsey Diamond.

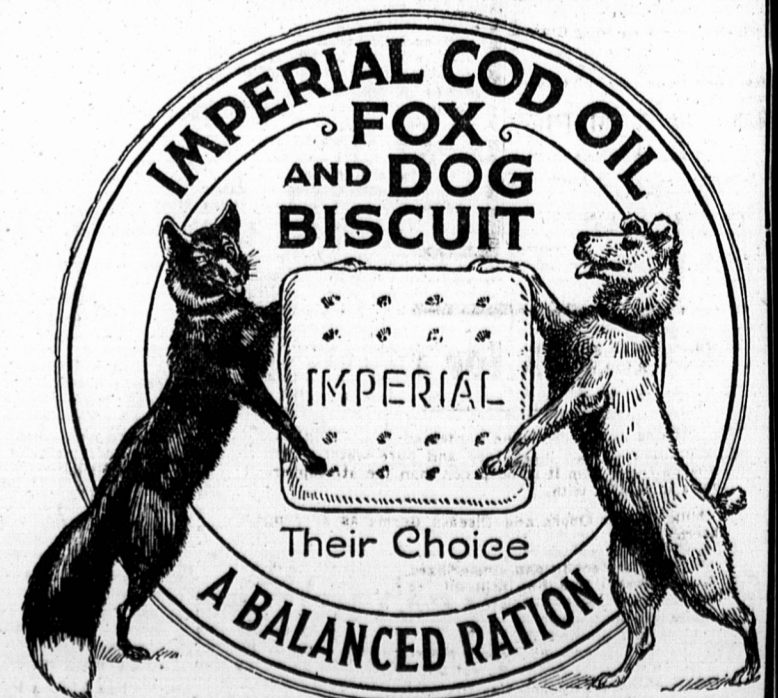
