(By Eddy Gilmore, Associated Press Staff Writer) MOSCOW, Sept. 18 (Friday) — (AP)—Bayonet-wielding Russian troops wiped out hundreds of German shock troops who smashed into Stalingrad's streets yesterday, and the main conflict still rages on the northwestern outskirts of the city where thousands of Nazis have fallen, the Soviets announced early today.

Supply Of Fuel Oil Precarious

Shortage of Reserves Emphasized By Munitions Minister Howe.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17 (CP)—Establishment of a new gasoline rationing category for all persons using a car for personal transportation and not for business, reducing the motor fuel available to them, will be effective Oct. 1, Munitions Minister Howe announced tonight.

Subs Take Toll Of Jap Shipping

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP) — The United States undersea campaign against Japan's vital western Pacific supply lines has resulted in the destruction of four more enemy ships, the navy announced today, and four other vessels have been damaged in recent operations.

Continuing the story of the epic struggle for Stalingrad, the communiqué said:

"Within two days one of our units destroyed 54 German tanks, 21 guns and 12 motor vehicles. They wiped out about 1,500 enemy officers and men.

U-Boat Torpedo Crashes Ashore At Quebec Village

MONTREAL, Sept. 17 (CP)—Letters to residents here reported tonight that a torpedo from an enemy U-boat missed its freighter target, crashed ashore at a Gulf of St. Lawrence Quebec village, shattered 123 windows but did no other damage.

2-Year Program For Agriculture Announced

OTTAWA, Sept. 17 (CP)—A two-year program of agricultural production, aimed at providing sufficient livestock and dairy products for Canada's own needs and the needs of her allies, was announced today by Agriculture Minister Gardiner.

Heavy Attack On Jap Base

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sept. 18 (Friday) — (AP)—Allied planes pumped 35,000 rounds of cannon and machinegun fire into the Japanese invasion base of Buna in New Guinea to destroy or damage at least 15 barges and start fuel dump fires visible for 25 miles, a communiqué said today.

Note Protests Deportation Of Refugees

OTTAWA, Sept. 17 (CP)—The Canadian government has asked René Ristelhueber, Vichy Minister of the Interior, to tell his government that Canada is gravely concerned over reports the French government is rounding up Jewish refugees who fled into unoccupied France with the intention of sending them back to Germany, a spokesman for the External Affairs Department told a press conference today.

LONDON, Sept. 17 (CP)—Mysterious balloons laden with explosives were reported over Hungary tonight, about 24 hours after the ever-strengthening British air arm had delivered a devastating smash with hundreds of bombers on the Ruhr Valley and the German city of Wiesbaden.

Front Line Account Of Nazi Failure

LONDON, Sept. 17 (CP) — A Reuters dispatch from Moscow tonight quoted a front-line account as saying a German effort to achieve a major breakthrough through the north-west has failed.

Strike Leaders Are Executed

LONDON, Sept. 17 (CP) — In a dispatch dated from the German frontier, Reuters reported today that the Germans had announced the execution of the leaders of the Luxembourg miners and steel workers who went on general strike last week in protest against Nazi measures.

Heavy Losses For Australia

CANBERRA, Australia, Sept. 17 (CP)—Australian war losses include 28,251 missing in action or captured by the enemy, Army Minister Francis Forde announced today.

Huge Bomb Tonnage

Meanwhile the British air ministry news service reported that last night's R. A. F. R. C. A. F. raid on the Ruhr had brought the tonnage of bombs dropped on Germany so far this month to almost 5,000. The raiders lost 39 planes last night but shot down two Nazi aircraft.

Spectacular Chase

In a spectacular chase, sometimes just above the sea, two Spitfires pursued two German Focke-Wulf 190s across the channel today and shot down one and damaged the other so severely it probably was lost, too, the air ministry news service said in a report of another action.
