Budget Debate Is Continued

Public Works Dept. Activities Reviewed By Hon. J. P. McIntyre

Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works, spoke for two hours in the Legislature last night and he was followed by Mr. Saville who moved the adjournment.

He began his opening remarks paid tribute to the speaker on his appointment.

He complimented the Leader of the Opposition for his speech on the budget and referred to the mention of the expenditure at Falconwood Hospital by Mr. MacMillan.

He explained that different factors entered into the yearly expenditures of that hospital, and cited comparative figures of the Bell, Leveson and Stewart-MacMillan Governments for expenditures on the institution.

He pointed out that the commodities for the year 1933 were much higher than at present and these prices have a bearing on the cost of running the institution.

The administration of the different departments of Government were much higher in some years than others, as was going on the cost of living becomes higher.

Mr. McIntyre quoted figures showing the comparative daily cost to patients over a period of years which showed a gradual increase.

The number of patients housed in the institution was a big factor to be taken into consideration when the cost of administration was considered, he reminded his listeners.

Lot of Money Spent

He agreed that a lot of money was spent at the Summerside quarters. The building had to be repaired, he explained.

Speaking of the Provincial Building he said that it was falling apart and he was going to have it repaired. It cost more than estimated as it had to be gone over completely.

He claimed that the furniture in the building was not good and some of it was disposed of.

Regarding the Court House, Mr. McIntyre said that the Court Room had to be remodelled and considerable money was spent. Some of the furniture of the Court House, which was stored in the attic, was burned, he thought.

Dr. MacMillan said that he understood none of the furniture was burned.

Storms Destroy Bridges

Mr. McIntyre spoke of the storm of last year which destroyed many bridges causing the department to exceed their estimate.

He told of sending men to different places in the Province to ascertain the amount of traffic on the highways.

He quoted figures showing the revenue from gasoline used by cars travelling over paved highways. He said that \$13,835 would be the revenue for a 5 mile stretch for 500 cars. Figures were also quoted for a longer stretch of road, by the speaker.

He pointed out that the interest on this money would pay for the maintenance of the highway and any Government is justified in paying the car owners the best in the roads as they are paying for it.

New Sources of Revenue Needed

If new sources of revenue can be tapped it is sound business to borrow money, he claimed.

The road policy is sound business he said.

Mr. McIntyre spoke of speeding on the highways and the number of automobile accidents. He said there were 321 accidents and 6 persons killed last year and maintained that the figure was too high for this Province when it is compared with Nova Scotia.

He stressed the need of cooperation among the car drivers and education in driving as the Police are unable to cope with all the traffic.

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE

Legislative Assembly, April 25, 1940

When the House opened at 3:15 p. m. Mr. Saville asked Premier Campbell about a question regarding a petition from residents of Sturgeon and Gasparaux, asking for the sub-grading and paving of the road from Montague, via Lower Montague, Sturgeon, Gasparaux and Murray Harbour North to Murray River.

Premier Campbell tabled the answers to the questions and they are to be found at the end of this article.

An Act to Amend An Act to Authorize the Levying of a Tax on Certain Incomes, was given first reading.

"The Agricultural Products Marketing Act"

On motion of Mr. Mustard the House went into committee on "The Agricultural Products Marketing Act" with Mr. Foley in the chair.

Mr. Mustard declared that the history of cooperatives in the Province has been one of successes and reverses. It had often been said that the difficulty was that the farmers "won't stick together." He cited as a reason for failures of cooperatives in the past.

He maintained that the cooperatives were doing splendid work on behalf of the farmers.

The promoter went on to explain that there were two seasons for marketing hogs—spring and fall and the latter shipping board supplied a monthly market for farmers. This enables them to take advantage of the marketing at any season.

He claimed that this legislation was destined for the protection, furtherance and improvement of the cooperative effort.

He stressed the need of the cooperative effort in the Province to control the price and cut down the cost of marketing.

Mr. Hughes

Mr. Hughes felt that the bill was of no avail and could do harm. He declared that the bill was ultra vires. This bill contemplates the establishment of a board which would buy and sell commodities in this Province. He referred to an Act passed in Saskatchewan in 1931 which established a board to buy grain in that Province.

He maintained that this Legislature had no power to control marketing beyond the Province, it must be done by a local view. It is outside Provincial jurisdiction.

The object of this Act is to control marketing of products marketed outside the Province.

"This Legislature has no power to attempt to control these things," he said.

He declared that he did not wish to see improper legislation passed.

The speaker cited the many different cases of co-operation.

Hon. Mr. Wright

Hon. Mr. Wright spoke of the different opinions of the different lawyers reviewing the bill. He claimed the bill should be discussed on its merits and not on its legal viewpoint.

The cooperative societies asked for legislation on the matter and it should not be postponed even if it is not in the interest of the Province. He claimed that there was nothing unreasonable in a way of selling their own products.

He appealed to the farmers of the Legislature to support the measure.

Mr. McIsaac

Mr. McIsaac said until the lawyers declare the bill ultra vires it is of no use for the rank and file of the Legislature to discuss it.

He claimed that there were other extra vires that were other than the Legislature which were ultra vires.

He also appealed to the farmers in the Legislature for support in passing the bill.

Hon. Mr. Dennis

Hon. Mr. Dennis said the farmers had asked for it. He asked Mr. Hughes about an Order in Council which had been passed in Ottawa, which would authorize the conditions of the bill when the legislation was passed.

Hon. Mr. Wright claimed that the fact the Act was in force in other Provinces was proof of its legality. It is in operation in New Brunswick.

Mr. Barbour asked the Minister of Agriculture for a copy of the letter sent to the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. McPhee

Mr. H. P. McPhee said that this was a measure on which the Government should declare a policy. He said if Hon. Mr. Wright spoke on behalf of the Government he should have declared a policy.

He declared that he was in sympathy with anything done to help agriculture and if it is proven to be not ultra vires he was prepared to support it.

It is difficult to give a valuable opinion on legislation of this kind, he said. The principle of the act seems to be the principle of the Federal Act.

"I'm inclined to think that the type of plan considered might possibly have features which would be ultra vires," he declared.

In answer to a question from Mr. Saville, Mr. McPhee said an Act passed in 1934 was passed to cure any defects in the system.

Premier Campbell said the opinion of Mr. McPhee worked only one way. He referred to the legal aspects of the question. Some parts of the act might be within the competence of this legislature and other parts might be ultra vires, he said. Are they severable from the rest of the Act, is the question.

It would be a waste of time to pass an act which is tinged with an illegality, he said.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan
Hon. Dr. MacMillan asked if a

Mr. Mustard

Mr. Mustard said that Mr. Jones was reading things into the bill which "weren't there at all. There is no compulsion in this bill."

The idea of the Legislature acting as a Board would be unthinkable, he said.

"As far as the Potato Growers are concerned, I don't think they are a co-operative but they would be allowed to come before the Board," he declared.

Hon. Mr. Wright said that the Potato Growers Association had heard of the bill and had heard that it was a co-operative. He said that was technically correct. The Association was forced out of cooperatives because of a heavy loss due to frost one season.

Cooperatives have failed in the past because of heavy overhead. The membership is falling off. The Potato Growers Association and the overhead was too great and they could not compete with other dealers, he said, citing this example of cooperatives failing.

He concluded by saying that he could not see anything to oppose in this bill.

Mr. McIsaac said that the Potato Growers should have been included in the P.E.I. Egg and Poultry Shippers were in favor of the bill.

Hon. J. A. Campbell

Hon. J. A. Campbell said that the House was divided, and the Opposition was divided on the question.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan said that he withdrew the statement as the Opposition were not divided on the question.

Hon. J. A. Campbell said that the lawyers were divided on the legal points of the question and it was difficult for the farmers to discuss it.

He pointed out that this was not the first attempt at cooperation in this Province. He spoke of cooperative stores as an example.

He stated that he was in favor of helping the farmer sell his product to the best advantage but was not in favor of compulsion.

It is not in the interest of the rank and file farmers in this Province to compel them to sell their products where the bill provided.

He charged that the Egg and poultry Assn. made a poor job of

their organization. "You can't blame the farmers for not selling their eggs at a loss," he said.

Mr. Mustard had to come to the aid of cooperatives in the Province, he claimed.

If it is a paying proposition the farmers will operate and are willing to sell at any time for a reasonable price.

If the bill goes through, I hope they use the people as they should, he said.

In conclusion he said the farmers are at the mercy of those who do business with and expressed the hope that the Board would be composed of honest members because the farmers would be at their mercy.

Mr. Mustard said after listening to Mr. Campbell it was difficult to say whether he was for or against the bill.

The bill was tabled for two weeks and that was plenty of time to give it consideration.

He said the representative should establish a board which would not have to go back to the people to ask about each bill. "That is carrying democracy to the extreme," he said.

Mr. Hughes said that the bill was just a form of compulsion.

Hon. Mr. Wright answered said that there was no form of compulsion in the act and he did not favor compulsion.

Mr. Baker suggested that the bill be brought into it and some of the sections deleted. "Practically the whole House is in favor of the principle," he said. He suggested that it be redrafted.

Mr. McPhee asked Hon. Mr. Dennis or Premier Campbell if legislation regarding a Marketing Act was passed by the Federal Government.

Hon. Mr. Dennis said it was not fair for a legal man to expect an answer from a layman.

Premier Campbell said that such legislation was passed, relating to the Act.

Mr. Jones said "The Natural Products Marketing Act" was passed by the Federal Government.

Suggests Redrafting

Mr. Jones suggested a delay and redrafting of the bill.

"There seems to be compulsion written into the bill," he said. There should not be compulsion in cooperation, he added.

He declared that this must be a Government measure because two Government members had been strongly favoring it.

He spoke of the grading of hogs by the Dominion Government which was a fine thing for agriculture.

He mentioned the origin of egg grading in this Province by Mr. Leighton at the P.E.I. Co-operative Egg and Poultry Association which system was copied by the Dominion Government.

He warned against a Board of three members which the bill provided for as it would have a "political flavor." A man would have to be paid for the work which the Legislature should be doing.

He cautioned the Legislature against hurrying the act through without some study of its aspects.

Many "Paid Officials"

The speaker charged that there were over a hundred paid officials of the Federal Government furthering agriculture in this Province.

He said the Potato Growers, the largest cooperative in this Province was not represented at all in the Act.

He suggested that the bill be redrafted, "some of the obnoxious sections cut out."

Opposes Delay

He was not in favor of delaying the proceeding on the act.

Mr. Hughes maintained that the trouble was that there was not enough study of the bill.

He claimed that Mr. Kiekham, President of the Dominion Legislative Association on Saturday night and when he learned of it went to Judge Fraser for information.

Mr. Robinson maintained that the bill was studied more than any other bill which had come before the House.

He stated that he was entirely opposed to giving the bill the six months hoist.

He referred to the success of the Food Marketing Act.

He expressed the opinion that the Dominion Marketing Act could be introduced to the Province to some benefit.

In conclusion he warned against granting too much authority in the Act.

Report Progress

On motion of Mr. Mustard progress was reported on the bill.

The following bills were given third reading and passed:

The Voluntary Working Up Act.
An Act Respecting Controverted Elections of Members of the Legislative Assembly.

An Act to Provide for the Prevention and Suppression of Fires.
The Public Vehicles Act.
An Act to Provide for Superannuation Allowances for School Teachers.
An Act Respecting the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities.
The House went into committee on "The Legal Profession Act" with Mr. Saville in the chair. It was reported agreed to without amendment.

At 6 o'clock the House adjourned until 8 p. m.

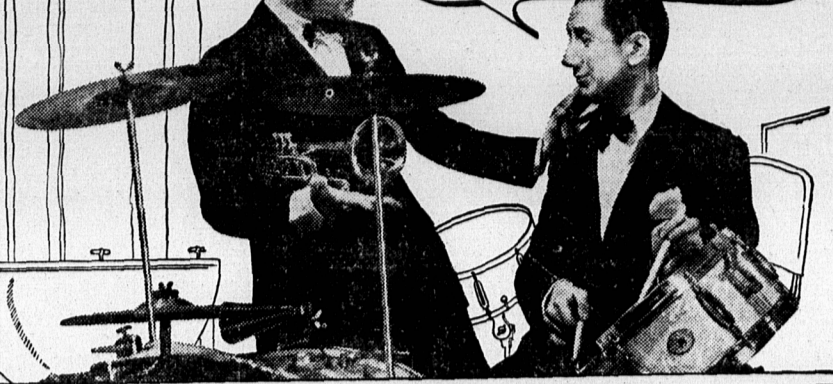
(2) Should petitions have been received, what is the policy of the Government regarding this road? (MR. SAVILLE)
