DROWNED SAILOR IS IDENTIFIED.

NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 12—From an examination made yesterday of the personal effects of Griffith H. Griffiths, the name under which the victim of last Wednesday's drowning at Beaver Narrows shipped as a sailor on the schooner E. B. Marvin it is evident that he wished to hide his identity. Although a cigar box was sufficient to hold all he left on the schooner, there are several articles in the assortment that leave no doubt in the mind of Capt. Murray that the man was George Henry Graves, at one time a resident of Yarmouth, N. S., where a couple of years ago he was employed as superintendent of L. Higgins & Co's shoe factory. He has been now finally identified by wire as Graves of Yarmouth.

ACCIDENTS ON AVIATION FIELD.

MINEOLA, N. Y., Oct. 14—Two accidents, fortunately of a minor nature, were caused by the gusty wind that blew over the aviation field here today. One of the guests struck the biplane of Mrs. Leslie Raiche, when she had reached a height of 20 feet in starting a flight and tipped it first to right and then to left so that both wings were crumpled.

Harry Harkness, the Cleveland aviator, met with a similar mishap. The wind caught his rising monoplane and turned the machine over. Harkness was tossed out and both wings of the monoplane were smashed. Neither Harkness nor Mrs. Raiche was injured.

DEGREE FROM BERLIN.

BERLIN, Oct. 14—The university of Berlin, which is celebrating its 100th anniversary, today conferred the degree of doctor of laws on Emperor William. His Majesty was not present at the ceremony.

The university also conferred the following degrees upon Americans:

Doctor of laws, Associate justice Oliver Wendell Holmes of the supreme court of the United States, and Prof. John William Burgess, dean of the faculty of political science in Columbia university in New York; doctor of philosophy, President A. C. Hadley of Yale; doctor of medicine, Prof. Theodore William Richards, professor of chemistry in Harvard and exchange professor in Berlin university in 1907.

RAISE IN FREIGHT RATES.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14—At a meeting yesterday in the office of the western trunk line committee, it was decided to postpone again the proposed advance in freight rates on certain commodities in the western territory, this time until February 1. The decision reached was in accordance with a request made some time ago by the interstate commerce commission.

BRITISH COLUMBIA SENDS SYMPATHY.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 15—One of the largest contributions to the fund for the people of Campbellton comes from the Government of British Columbia. It is \$2,500, and has been sent by the Premier of the Pacific Province to the Premier of New Brunswick.

APRECIATION OF A BANK MANAGER.

MIDDLETON, October 14—Last evening a farewell banquet was tendered to C. W. Montgomery at the American house by members of the board of trade. For three years Mr. Montgomery has resided in Middleton as manager of The Canadian Bank of Commerce, and for the past two years he has been president of the board of trade. He has been a very useful and public-spirited citizen. About thirty of the leading citizens gathered at the banquet room to indicate their appreciation of the guest of the evening. F. L. Shaffner, vice-president of the board, presided. Toasts to the king, the town, the board of trade, the driving park company, our bank, institutions, our churches, the ladies, and our guest, were duly honored.

KNOW NOT SHELDON.

CAR AND AUTO CRASH.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—The hood that brought disaster to the first attempt at operating a monorail car between Bristol station, Westchester County, and City Island in July, causing the injury of practically every passenger on board, was apparently still in the air today.

When an effort was made to resume the service, the very first car sent out struck an auto mobile, smashing the machine to bits and severely injuring the occupants. Heretofore, the hood of the machine, and Charles Dietch, passengers in the monorail car escaped without a scratch.

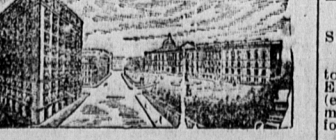

MONTREAL, Oct. 15—Sheldon, whose sudden departure many people in Canada are mourning, was heard from last night. Two letters dated New York were received. In both letters Sheldon claims that he went to New York to get funds to meet demands upon him and failed in doing so, but that his New York backers are willing to set him up in business in New York. He adds, that he will make money enough to come back and pay all he owes.

MUCH EXCITEMENT BUT NO DAMAGE.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15—An outbreak of fire in St. Mary's College on Bleury Street last evening, caused a stampede among 500 boys. The second alarm was rung, but the outbreak was speedily discovered. Little damage was done and no one was injured although considerable excitement prevailed.

UNIVERSITY FOR THE CHINESE.

TORONTO, Oct. 15—The establishment of a Christian University at Chengtu West China, under the joint auspices of four great missionary organizations, has received ratification at the hands of the general Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

DRY DOCK CO. ASKS LARGE SUM.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—The plans and proposals of the Dominion Dock Company for \$4,000,000 dock at Levis have been referred back to the Company after an examination by the public works department. It is understood that the examination of the plans should be what the company appears to anticipate.

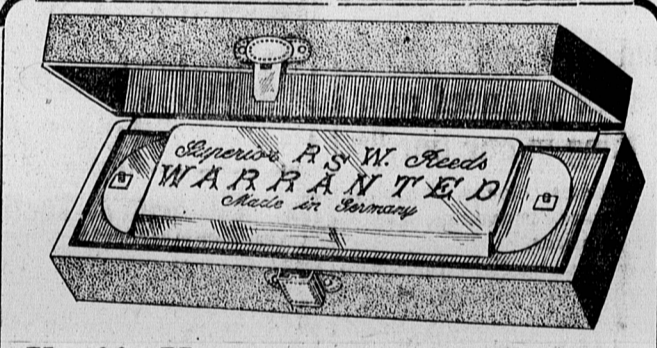
