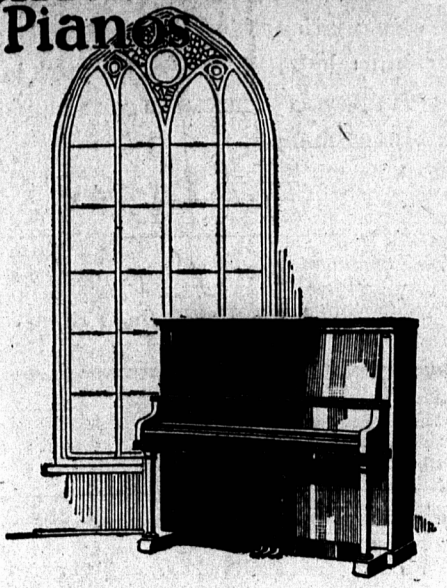

Paraboro, May 5-The death occurred at an early hour Thursday morning of John William Smith, at the home of his son, Freeman Smith with whom he had made his home during the past six or seven years. C.P.R. Optimistic

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, May 7.-General confidence throughout Canada is unshaken by the combination of unusual conditions which has developed during the present situation. The country's strength has been effectively proven and the future is not to be viewed with any degree of apprehension, in the opinion of E. W. Beatty, chairman and President of the C. P. R., as declared to the shareholders of the Company at the annual meeting held here today. While a number of factors, particularly the failure to market Canadian grain have slowed up freight traffic, it is felt that there is nothing of a fundamental character to prevent the return of normal business conditions within the next few months. Robert Samuel McLaughlin of Ottawa, Ont., was elected a director of the Company today. Director were re-elected. The board included Sir Chas. Gordon, C. B. E., Ross H. McMaster, Rt. Hon. Reg. McKenna, Jas. A. S. Richardson and W. J. Blake Wilson. The shareholders approved the split of the common stock, four shares for one recently authorized by parliament.

After a short business meeting, Miss Roberta Spencer kindly gave a most instructive talk on the famous musical composer, Sir Arthur Sullivan, born about 1840, whose delightful works from "The Sorcerer," "H. M. S. Pinafore," on to "The Gondoliers" and "Utopia Ltd.," successfully established something altogether new in British musical art. Sullivan also wrote some fine hymn tunes which can never die. One of them we all know-the tune "St. Gertrude," sung to "Onward Christian Soldiers." He wrote such songs as "Sweethearts" and "The Lost Chord." For the first-named song he received \$3,500 from the publishers and the second brought him a handsome yearly income from the time of its publication onward.

For her highly interesting address Miss Spencer was given a hearty vote of thanks, after which the guests were ushered to the dining room in the centre of which stood a table decorated with a huge white wedding cake artistically trimmed with candles and colored streamers and around this the gifts were clustered, and gracefully presented by Miss Evelyn Simmons, dressed as a winsome little bride. Miss Vincent, the guest of honour, was led to the room by the Class President, Miss Davida Baker, and seated by the table. Many beautiful pieces of silver, cut glass, china, pyrex, linen and other useful gifts were presented, and much merriment caused as the witty verses were read, after which she thanked all present in her usual bright and charming manner. Miss Vincent has made many warm friends during her visit to Charlottetown. Her marriage takes place in Nova Scotia during this month and all join in wishing her a bright and happy future.
