ALL HIS SONS KILLED

WIGAN, England, Nov. 28.—Rev. C. H. James, Vicar of Haigh, has received notification that his fourth son, Sergt. H. James, Middlesex Regiment, reported missing, is now believed to have been killed in action. He was assistant solicitor to the Halifax Corporation and a graduate of St. John's Cambridge.

Lieut. G. Sydney James, Manchester was killed in the Dardanelles; Captain F. A. James, of the same regiment, died of wounds received in the same campaign, and Corporal C. E. James, Middlesex Regiment, has also made the great sacrifice. All the vicar's sons have now died in the war.

LARGEST LOCOMOTIVE IN THE WORLD

ALTOONA, Pa., Nov. 22.—What is said to be the largest electric locomotive in this country has just been assembled at the Pennsylvania railroad's Juanita plant here and is now in the paint shop. Within a fortnight it will be sent to the Westinghouse plant at Pittsburg to be equipped with motors.

Plans for the monster were made in Altoona, and workmen have been engaged in building for three months. It will obtain power from an overhead wire system and has a hauling capacity equal to three steam engines of the L. & N. type in use on the Pittsburg Division.

The machine is really two locomotives in one and is 80 feet long. When ready for service it will be sent to the Norfolk and Western road, a large part of which is electrified.

HUNS SEND TWO SUBMARINES TO THIS SIDE OF THE ATLANTIC.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—It became known yesterday that reports had reached the officers of the British, French and Italian steamship lines in this city that two German submarines had eluded the patrols on the other side of the Atlantic and might arrive off Nantucket Lightship at any time. They belong to the U-55 class, and the reports said they have been sent over by the German admiralty to raid Allied commerce off this coast.

It is expected in British shipping circles that one of the German submarines will cruise near Nantucket, while the other will wait near Sable Island, with the object of sinking one of the big transports taking troops from Halifax to England. The Mauritania has been taking sick and wounded Canadians from Liverpool to Halifax, and the Olympic has carried more than 50,000 troops from Canada to Liverpool.
