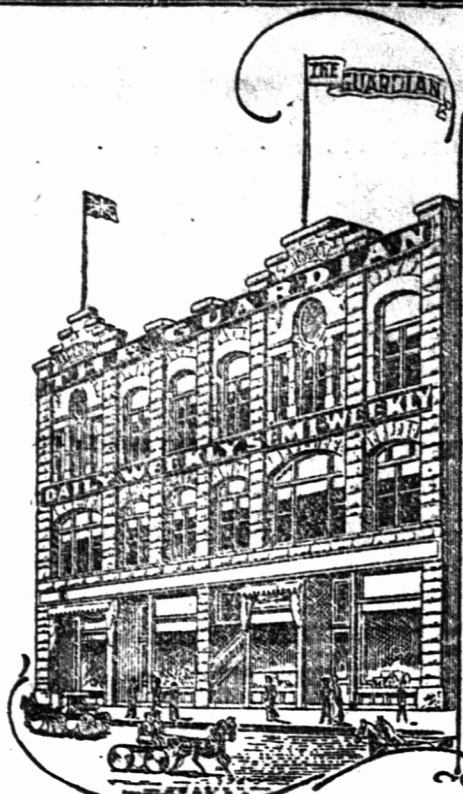

Since our article on the Board of Trade meeting was in type the Patriot comes to hand with a statement very different from its first announcement in regard to the Packing Company. It now says: "The Patriot announced the fact that such a proposition was under consideration". It before stated that an agreement had been entered into, which is the fact of the matter. The community would even now be very much relieved to learn that the proposals of the outside capitalists are still open to be considered and approved or rejected on their merits. We greatly fear that such is not the case.

Mr. Hays, General Manager of the Grand Trunk Railway system has prepared an ambitious plan for its development and extension as a transcontinental road. The Grand Trunk now runs from Portland, Maine to Chicago. It will first be extended to St. Paul and Minneapolis, thence Northwest into Manitoba and thence parallel with the C. P. R. to the Pacific coast. It is given out that the work of construction will begin next year. It is therefore on the cards that within a few years Canada may have three trans-continental railways, the C. P. R. the G. T. R. and the Canadian Northern, which latter will touch Hudson's Bay in its far northern route.

La Patrie, owned and published by the sons of Minister Tarte, appears to be about the only Liberal journal in Canada, which supports the crusade in favor of protection. Under such conditions it is not very likely that the Tarte tail will wag the Liberal dog.

Mr. Tarte claims that Sir Wilfrid Laurier came back from Washington a few years ago so "red hot" that he became a convert to the retaliation policy. Sir Wilfrid has spoken many times since that, but never along the lines stated by Mr. Tarte. He did say, very properly, that he would make no more overtures to Washington. In one of his speeches, at the Mulock demonstration in Toronto in December last he said, with his usual good sense and moderation:

"For my part I am not disposed to follow the example of other nations in reference to tariff policy to treat them as they treat us, to give them a Roland for an Oliver. Sir, Canada is not going to put herself at the beck of any nation. We are not to be imitators. We are pioneers in civilization. Other nations can paddle their own canoe as they want. We shall paddle ours according to what we believe is in the best interests of Canada."

The latest issue of the Prince Edward Island Magazine is of more than usual merit and interest, and especially to its many Island readers. The frontispiece is an excellent likeness of Hon. D. Farquharson, M. P. The initial article is a graphically written pen picture of what is known as the great American gale of 1851, with many interesting particulars of the wreck and appalling losses of life. This gale occurred at this time of year, fifty-one years ago, beginning on 4th, October 1851. It is a coincidence that it was followed on the same date 18 years later by the famous Six by gale, perhaps the most memorable that ever occurred on the New England coast, accompanied by the highest recorded tides in the Bay of Fundy. There are many other articles of almost equal interest including Lord Selkirk's Settlers in P. E. Island, by M. A. C.; the beginning of Pichon's narrative of a visit to the Island in 1752; an illustrated article on the P. E. Island Militia, with other articles of fiction, poetry, &c. The number is easily worth the price of a year's subscription to the Magazine.
