

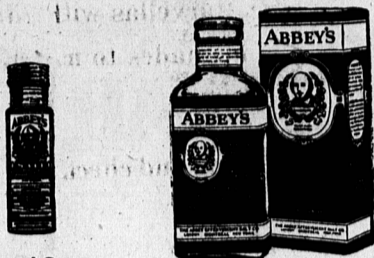

MURRAY HARBOR RAILWAY

Sir,—The standardization of the Murray Harbor Branch Railway—one of the subjects treated at the annual meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade is a matter that ought to engage the serious attention of our railway authorities. This branch is the only section of "the narrow gauge" remaining in the Province and, I believe, in all Canada. It passes through a thickly settled and highly productive part of the country. When millions are being spent in the construction of a broad gauge railway to Hudson Bay, a hundred thousand or so might well be expended in the broadening of the gauge between Charlottetown and Murray Harbor. No doubt the adaptation of the Hillsborough Bridge to the heavier traffic of a broad gauge railway will require some attention on the part of the railway engineers. But that difficulty can be overcome. Nothing is impossible to the engineering skill of these days. Thousands of dollars would be saved every year if the need to transfer all the freight to and from the Murray Harbor Branch line were avoided. And if the grade were standardized the traffic on the line would, without doubt, be increased to such an extent that the C. N. R. would soon be recouped its outlay for the work to be done.

I am not one of those who would prejudice in any way the Beach Grove Inn. But if, as members of the Associated Board of Trade seem to think, a large first-class hotel in Charlottetown, well advertised, would attract tourist visitors in large numbers, and add to the customers of the hotels already provided, the former proposal might well, I think, be revived and consideration given to the exchange of the old Government House property for the town eligible for the residence of future Lieutenant Governors who may not be able, as Lieut. Governor Heartz is to provide a house of their own. There is in all Canada no better site for a summer hotel than that of the old Government House. The scenery about it is beautiful. It is within a stones' throw of salt water bathing at high tide. The public park adjoining will forever afford grounds for games and exercises of various kinds. The buildings might, at comparatively small expense, be refitted and furnished to accommodate a large number of summer guests.

If this matter were taken up by the Provincial Government the Lieut. Governor and the managers of the C. N. R. an arrangement might easily be arrived at by which the latter could obtain the property for a term of years—if not forever—and the scandal and disgrace of having it left tenantless and empty removed.
