INTER-IMPERIAL NEWS-PAPER POSTAGE.

The postage on a daily newspaper sent from Canada to Great Britain is six dollars a year, or more than the average price of subscription.

The postage upon British newspapers coming to Canada is equally high.

The effect of it is that few British newspapers reach Canada and still fewer Canadian newspapers find their way to the British Isles.

Bear in mind that these conditions exist between two parts of King Edward's dominions both of which are committed to penny postage for letters.

Letter postage has been cheapened throughout the greater part of the Empire.

Newspaper postage in Canada is merely nominal.

It is also merely nominal in the United States and between the United States and Canada.

In the British Islands it is higher, but not altogether excessive, but between Britain and Canada it is almost absolutely prohibitory.

We regard the toleration of such conditions by the British postal authorities as a piece of inexplicable stupidity, the more inexplicable from the low rate of letter postage that has for some time existed.

The fault lies on the other side of the ocean altogether. Our Government and people, and especially our newspaper publishers desire to see the obstruction cleared away.

This odious tax upon intelligence, and especially upon intelligence in printed form passing between two portions of the same Empire, is wholly chargeable to the British Government and postal authorities.

It is the main cause of the dense ignorance which prevails in the British Isles with regard to Canada.

It is also the main reason why the average Canadian is by no means so well informed as he ought to be with regard to what is transpiring in the Mother Country.

Nor is this all. We are quite as badly off with regard to the telegraphic news service across the Atlantic.

No one should be better informed with regard to the close relations between the mail and telegraph services than those in authority in the British Isles, because within the United Kingdom the postal service and the telegraph service are both under Government control.

But in the matter of transmission of news across the Atlantic all is different. The cable companies are private corporations. Hence it results that the news service between the Old and New Worlds being chiefly between the United States and Great Britain, is controlled very largely by the press associations which have their home in the United States.

As a matter of fact nine tenths of all the news, political and general which passes between Canada and the United States is filtered through American agencies or prepared primarily for the United States market.

Thus but scant gleanings of Canadian news reach the Mother Country and these are colored to suit the United States view while of British news that Canada receives is at second hand, and made up of items and topics often selected by persons who have no good will for either Canada or Britain.

Britain from this side of the water treat's Canada as of very little importance in a general way, and often perverts and mis-colors the little that is sent. So it falls out that the prohibitory postal rates and the bad conditions of the cable service each assists to accentuate the faults and shortcomings of the other.

We doubly need a direct press telegraph service between Canada and Britain to relieve the outlandish restrictions of prohibitive newspaper postage.

And equally the newspaper postage becomes doubly intolerable because the cable service is so bad as it is.

If there is one matter which our Canadian government should bend all its energies to have reformed at the earliest possible moment it is this. On all grounds, for the better understanding of each other by the British and Canadian people, on grounds of patriotism and of imperial interest, as well as in the interest of general information on both sides of the Atlantic, the postal and telegraphic services ought to be reformed.

As it is a hundred American newspapers, and magazines, often distinctly anti-British and anti-Canadian in tone, are circulated in Canada for every one British newspaper or magazine circulated here.

It is amazing that in the twentieth century, and between two portions of the same Empire, in many respects holding an advanced position in postal and telegraphic matters, such conditions can now exist.
