Newer methods and more modern appliances are being introduced which will greatly reduce the cost of production. —There was a fairly well attended meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade last night. President McArthur occupied the chair. R. H. McDonald reported on behalf of the Statistical Committee previously appointed. The committee suggested that legislation be enacted providing that masters of vessels be required to report to the Customs when entering or clearing, quantity of cargo inwards and outwards, coastwise as well as foreign trade. Mr. McDonald had interviewed Premier Mathieson and received his promise to give the matter consideration. A discussion followed with reference to the expected visit of the Ministers of Railways and arrangements made in connection therewith.

QUEBEC ELECTIONS

NEXT WEDNESDAY

MONTREAL, May 9.—The official nominations were made yesterday for provincial elections to be held next Wednesday.

In two constituencies, Gaspé and Magdalen Islands, polling will not take place till two weeks later. But the Gaspé nominations were made today.

From the returns at present at hand it seems that there will be no election by acclamation.

In Arthabaska there is no government candidate, but Camille Demarigny is opposing Jean Prevost, the present member, both running as Conservatives. Mr. Prevost also running in L'Assomption.

Sir Louis Gouin has undertaken to carry St. John's as well as his own constituency, Fortouet.

Armond Lavergne, a young Nationalist and Henri Bourassa's right hand man when the latter was in the Quebec Assembly, is contesting both Montmorency and Montmagny.

In Arthabaska Arthur Gilbert, Nationalist, who carried the division in a Federal bye election, but who failed to keep it, September, is running as the Opposition candidate.

Several labour candidates and independents, are in the field, especially in the cities.

The campaign promises to be an interesting one. The government is seeking to return to power on the ground of its Progressive Policy, especially in regard to education, road roads and public works, while the opposition attacks it on ground of extravagance and wasteful expenditure.

In the carrying out of policies, it is also claimed that Montreal has not sufficient autonomy, and is too much under the rule of the legislature. Montreal pays half revenue of the Province and has a third of the entire population.

The Federal Ministers from this Province are to some extent, participating in ramifying on behalf of opposition, while Rudolph Lemieux is among the strongest fighters.
