A quiet home wedding took place at the residence of Adam and Mrs. Brown, New Glasgow on Wednesday evening, August 26th when his eldest daughter Ella B. was united in marriage to Benj. C. Woolner of North Rustico. The ceremony was performed by Rev. George Millar in presence of the immediate relatives of the contracting parties. The bride who was gowned in white was attended by Miss Mabel A. Woolner who was prettily attired in muslin trimmed with lace and ribbon. Russell McClure of North Rustico supported the groom. After supper a very enjoyable evening was spent in music and conversation pleasantly interrupted by the arrival of some uninvited guests whose gay costumes afforded amusement for all. Accompanied by the best wishes of their many friends the happy couple drove to their future home at North Rustico.

On Saturday, Aug 29th, 1903, a very deep gloom came over the settlement of Winsloe by the announcement of the death of Miss Annie Holman, one of its most respected young ladies. Our beloved young sister was stricken with appendicitis on Wednesday night and removed to the P. E. I. Hospital on Thursday for the purpose of undergoing an operation. Being of rather delicate constitution and the disease having developed rather much before the operation, she departed this life some twenty-eight hours after its performance. Her remains were brought to her home at Winsloe (Mr. John Holman's) Saturday afternoon and interred in the Methodist graveyard Sunday afternoon. Deceased was twenty-three years of age and during her short life was the subject of much suffering which she bore with the utmost calmness and patience. She possessed a very amiable disposition, being cheerful, sociable, and easy of acquaintance in her manner thus endearing herself to all who came within her influence and contributing to the comfort and cheer of her home. The very high esteem in which she was held by all who knew her was very strongly in evidence on the occasion of her funeral by the very large number who came to pay their last earthly tribute of respect to her memory.

At an early age she joined the Methodist Church a member of which she remained till the moment she quitted the church militant, to join the church triumphant. As a Christian she was not of the demonstrative stamp, rather among the reserved yet possessing a keen sense of the demands of the Christian life, showing humility and contrition when conscious of imperfection and inconsistency. In her last hours, though, like all young people especially, very anxious to get better if it were the will of God, yet a person could not be but impressed by the expression of peace and hope upon her countenance. A few hours before the end came she told her guardians that she had asked the Lord to forgive all her imperfections and inconsistencies of her life and that she believed the Lord does so and that she would go to Heaven if she died.

We assure her guardians to whom she seemed so precious, the profoundest sympathy of all friends and earnestly commend them to the friendship and sympathy of the Saviour who has promised to never leave nor forsake those who put their trust in Him.
