**AIR RAID VICTIMS IN LONDON ARE GIVEN COMPLETE WARDROBES; BRIGHT COLORED CLOTHES ATTRACT**

LONDON—One of the cheeriest places in London is a crowded room in a municipal building, just west of Lambeth. Portly marions from houses that now lie in ruins are having a field day choosing clothes from packages in heaps that extend from floor to ceiling. Workers, who have scarcely room to turn, are asiling in the grand turnover and final decisions, handing out advice and wearables to a seemingly endless stream of clothed-bedecked Cockney dowagers who have lost their all.

The piles of garments hold fascination for these indigent women, with plaster dust still in their bedraggled hair and night clothes under their shoddy creased coats. There's glamor in the sheen of a second-hand satin dress, come in the knowledge that the thickness of that wool means warmth, and a grand feeling of re-establishment in being given underwear straight from the package in which it came from the makers.

"I have never had really new things before" several women told the workers. "Jumble sales are 'left off wardrobe' shops are the familiar shoring fields for women who have always had their own spending money in halfpennies.

"GOOD BIG SIZE"

They drag out brightly colored clothes from in among the tall piles, measure collars or shirts carefully with their thumbs—explaining that their men "take a good big size"—and do a little trying on at the back of the crowd. Children's clothes are looked over shrewdly then folded into rolls and stuck in the shopping bags, so no other covetous eyes may be cast upon them.

Choosing a new wardrobe for the entire family is not a one day's job but a first job occupation that extends from day to day, over a great gathering place that room, and a history of the Lambeth raids could be written from its conversation.

"I'm sleeping in the Methodist hall and it's lovely" was one remark. "I overheard on the subject of billets, the speaker adding 'with beautiful fulnessness' 'I must be getting along or I'll miss my dinner. They feed us well and regular."

**News Briefs**

**OTTAWA, Dec. 11 — (CP) —**To reach and enlist the particular class of men required, at the same time obviating fruitless journeys by applicants to recruiting centres, the Royal Canadian Air Force announced late today it had revised its recruiting plans. Augmented staffs will be provided at centres with headquarters at Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon Regina, Winnipeg, North Bay, Windsor, London, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec City, Moncton, Charlottetown and Halifax. Recruiting officers from these centres will visit communities within their districts at regular intervals to interview prospective recruits thus making trips by unsuitable applicants unnecessary.

**TORONTO, Dec. 1 — (CP) —**National officials of the Canadian Red Cross Society announced tonight the recent appeal for funds had passed the \$5,000,000 objective and the total realized to date is \$5,904,989. They expected that figure would be exceeded when final figures have been received from Alberta. Results of the appeal in other provinces, each of which exceeded the provincial objective were: Nova Scotia, \$230,151; New Brunswick, \$130,088; Prince Edward Island, \$28,000; Quebec, \$1,245,000; Ontario, \$2,889,236; Manitoba, \$368,000; Saskatchewan, \$350,000; British Columbia, \$535,000.

**GRIMSBY, Ont., Dec. 11 — (CP) —**Formation of an Empire war cabinet, which "was one of the greatest contributing factors to our smashing victory in the last war," was urged in an address tonight by Cal. George A. Drew, Ontario Conservative leader.

**LONDON, Dec. 11 — (CP) Lord Woolton, Minister of Food, said today that Britain's bread supply has not failed in any English town "even after the most severe bombing attacks," the British Broadcasting Corporation reported tonight.**

"The 25,000 bakeries in the country have arranged to supply each other with enough loaves when bombs cut off essential water and heat," Lord Woolton said.
