OBITUARY.—The home of the late Cap. John Herling has recently been saddened by two deaths that of father and son, both occurring within a month of each other. On June 12th last their son, a bright youth of 9 years, died, having suffered greatly of heart trouble and other ailments. Manitoba's Harvest Fields.

Dear Sir,—I promised to let you know a little about Manitoba and I think this would be a good time as I see a number of our boys have come out here to work in the harvest fields. The old saying is "Far away cows wear long horns, and by all reports the boys have had a hard time to get the work they expected to find so easily. In fact it is hard to get a job at low wages. The C. P. R. and the G. N. R. send out a lot of men through Manitoba, to see how the crops looked and all came back with good reports like Caleb and Joshua of old, but I am afraid not quite so truthful. The railroads wanted to make a good thing out of it and advertised for 20,000 men to take up the harvest, wages to be from 25 to 50 per month and thus brought out 18,000 more men than they could get work for in the harvest field. Some went to the railroads to work others in the quarries, some to the Rainy River and some to the gold mines and a number went back to Ontario, and all say they won't be fooled so easily again. I know two men who got \$35 dollars a month when the big rush was on and when our boys came they were discharged and taken on again at only \$15 per month. The farmers can't afford to give such big wages. Wheat is turning out from 12 to 35 bushels to the acre instead of from 40 to 50 bushels to the acre as reported, that is of early wheat, the later wheat and oats have rushed and the crops are a complete failure, so you see the reason the farmers cannot give big wages. The first crop is a fine crop all A 1, and is now 13 cents per bushel. Now last year we had a poor crop the farmers only had their seed and bread, and could not meet their bills which will make it hard with them this year. The worst I see with the papers out here is that they lead the people to believe that the country is much better than it is. My advice to the people of P. E. I. is if you have a good farm hold on to it. If you cannot make a living on it come out here. It is better than going to Boston, Mass. We have a very healthy climate out here and as I worked in Boston 15 years I know what I say. I made good wages in the summer time and could save, but in the winter I must tell you about the big storms we have. Some were bad thunder storms, others were hail. On the 23rd of May we had a terrible hail storm, some of the hail was as big as hen's egg, and you could see the hail breaking the windows and you would think that the horses and cattle would go crazy some of them getting so wild that they ran into the wire fences cutting themselves very much. This storm started at Dunrea passed over Ninette, Belmont and Grandeur for a distance of 50 miles leaving the beautiful green fields as blank as if they were never sown. The wind was very heavy some barns 100 by 50 feet being blown down and smashed. More later.
