WEDDING BELLS.—A pretty wedding took place at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Crawford, 2341 Gravelly Street, Vancouver, B. C., on October 16th, when Miss Annie May McLean was united in marriage to Mr. Charles Gordon Callbeck, both of Prince Edward Island. The Rev. A. W. McLeod, assisted by the Rev. G. S. Paul, performed the ceremony in the presence of the intimate friends of the contracting parties. Mr. and Mrs. Callbeck will reside in Vancouver, at 1154 Robson Street. The bride is a daughter of the late Mr. John McLean, of Argyle, and the groom is a son of Mr. W. B. Callbeck, Tryon.

WILL PROBATED.—The will of the late Alexander Gillis, carpenter of Charlottetown, has been probated. He left no real estate, and his personal property consisted of cash on hand and money deposited in the Government Savings Bank amounting in all to \$27,717. The beneficiaries include the following:—To the trustees of the People's Church, \$180 for Foreign or Home Missions in the discretion of the trustees. To the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A., \$200. The Ministers and Trustees of Zion Church, \$150, to be applied as follows: \$100 on account of debt on the new church, the balance to be applied by them for home and foreign mission funds as they shall, in their absolute discretion, think proper. The British and Foreign Bible Society, \$300. He also bequeathed to his executors \$200 to be placed on interest in the Dominion Government Savings Bank or in some chartered bank, and they shall distribute the same in equal payments yearly for the next ten years at the Christmas season among the deserving poor of Charlottetown. The City Dispensary, \$100. His niece, Hattie Gillis, of Boston, \$300. His nephew, Alexander Gillis, of New Argyle, \$150 and watch and chain. Archibald Stewart, of Argyle Shore, son of Dugald Stewart, \$100. John Gillis, brother of deceased, trunks, clothing and other personal effects. The Presbyterian Church at Hartsville, Strathalbyn, \$450, of which \$150 is to be used for Foreign Missions. The executors, Donald McKinnon, barrister, and John T. MacKenzie, merchant tailor, \$50 each. After payment of funeral and testamentary expenses and debts, the residue of the estate, if any, is to be divided amongst all the legatees (except John Gillis and executor) in proportion to the amount or amounts of the bequests. The will is dated September 21st, 1916.
