Salary for the housekeeper to have a larger income that the family may live in their accustomed comfort.

We are glad to be able to report that we know of no case where after consultation with, and explanation to the beneficiary, or the Soldier, there has not been satisfaction with the amount allotted; and even when assistance has had to be refused there are but few cases of dissatisfaction.

From the first this Committee made it a rule in every case where the amount allotted justified it, of putting aside in a Savings Bank account a portion of this allotment, paying in cash only what was required for present needs, granting assistance out of this account from time to time when necessary.

The work of assisting dependents out of their Savings accounts occupies much time, and entails much labour, and it is not at all times easy to draw the line between small extravagance and real need. With the assistance of the Ladies Auxiliary particularly of their President, Mrs. W. W. Clarke, it is believed legitimate needs have been fully satisfied, while conserving these Savings Bank accounts as far as possible for the family and the Soldier on his return home.

There are, in all, Seventy-three Savings Bank accounts. We are possibly the only Branch that has continuously adopted this rule; and experience has shown us that it has worked admirably, relieving sudden and unexpected distress at the moment it is needed; in encouraging habits of thrift and saving, and giving the beneficiaries the satisfaction of a Bank balance—their own savings—in some cases amounting to over \$120.00.

This year again we have distributed the Fund without any expense, except postage and a small honorarium for the lady stenographer.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Clarke and the Auxiliary Committee, and to the many Ladies and Gentlemen to whom we have privately written for information, and whose ready response has been of great assistance in our work.

In conclusion the Chairman desires to thank all the members of this Committee for their regular attendance at all monthly meetings, and their ready assistance in necessary investigations.

Mr. Binning submitted the financial report as follows:
MR. BINNING'S REPORT.

The statement submitted herewith shows receipts and expenditures of the P. E. Branch of the Patriotic Fund, from Nov. 25th, 1915 to Nov. 17th, 1916.

The total subscriptions from the public in the balance carried forward, Nov. 26, 1915, covering the current fiscal year, amount to \$25,490.31. A communication from the Premier of the Province, The Hon. J. A. Matheson, has been received by the Ho-

norary Secretary, Mr. C. R. Smallwood, stating that a contribution from the Government of \$15,000, is available for 1916. This will bring the total income of the P. E. Island Branch, for the fiscal year just ending, up to \$40,490.31.

For comparative purposes, it might be of interest to state, that total subscriptions from the public for fiscal year ending Nov. 26, 1916—including a \$2,000 subscription from the City of Charlottetown—were \$14,532.77. This together with the 1915 contribution from the Local Government of \$15,000, brought the aggregate revenue for 1915, up to \$29,532.77. It will therefore be noted from the figures submitted that the contributions from the public for 1916, exceed those of 1915 by \$10,957.54, or deducting balance of \$1,229.93 carried forward from 1915, by \$9,727.61.

While the fiscal year of this Branch closed in 1915 on Nov. 26th, the financial year of the Central Committee at Ottawa, ended Dec. 31, 1915.

The Honorary Secretary, Sir Herbert Ames, has intimated that for the calendar year 1916, the Central Committee hopes the Prince Edward Island Branch, will contribute at least \$40,000. If the amount asked for is to be realized, it will be necessary to raise in this Province, between now and Dec. 31st next, the additional sum of \$6,294.87. There is \$656 outstanding in unpaid pledges, on the books of the Branch.

The President said that Rev. Dr. Fullerton had asked that a meeting should be called in order that those responsible for recruiting should obtain the necessary information about Patriotic Fund Relief to put before the recruiting meetings.

Rev. Dr. Fullerton asked in the first place whether the instructions of the Central Committee with regard to widows were being adhered to.

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald said that the Relief Committee had resolved to lend to the widows the amount they had been receiving until such time as they received their pensions.

Rev. Dr. Fullerton said he was pleased to hear that decision as they required six months to settle an estate of a deceased soldier. Proceeding, Dr. Fullerton said that when they started recruiting they were furnished with leaflets by the headquarters stating that a wife and family of three were entitled to \$45 per month apart from any allowance the soldier might make from his pay. He wanted to know if they were still justified in making that promise. The province had pledged itself to raise another 1,000 men and as they were just starting another recruiting campaign it was necessary they should have definite information to lay before their meetings. The various inquiries by mail and personal calls regarding the allocation of relief from the Patriotic Fund.

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald said that the scale under which the Patriotic Fund worked provided that the family of the soldier should be supplied with just such comfort as it had before the soldier left. There was no hard and fast scale of \$45 for every family. He said that in his experience of over two years the P. F. had given satisfaction everywhere. He would be only too glad to put on the table all the correspondence that he had had—multitudinous as it was—and with the exception of half-a-dozen cases there had been expressed satisfaction with the amount which every beneficiary had received.

Dr. Fullerton replied that he was not there as a carping critic. He had been in Ottawa and interviewed the men at the head of the Fund, and he had had the honour and privilege and pleasure of informing them when they were complaining about the Fund being in an unsatisfactory condition that if all over Canada they had administered the P. F. as Justice Fitzgerald had done in Prince Edward Island, it would be in a most satisfactory condition.

THE CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS.

The Chairman, Sir Wm. W. Sullivan, Chief Justice, said that the first part of the duty that fell to the Committee having been completed, the next thing for consideration was the question of ways and means for 1917. He said that the expenditures of the Fund were advancing by leaps and bounds. He spoke of the general Fund as administered in Ottawa, in the year 1914 the expenditure was \$511,000. In 1915 it was \$4,200,000, for 1916 nearly ten millions were required, while the estimate for 1917 was \$13,500,000. The situation was serious, and a strenuous effort all over Canada was necessary to meet this enormous amount required for the coming year. The Chairman then read a letter which had been received from Sir Herbert Ames, the Secretary of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, whose absence he regretted. Sir Herbert, he explained had purposed visiting the province during Exhibition, but after consideration deemed the time opportune and consequently postponed his visit. The letter was dated November 9th, and was addressed to the provincial treasurer of the

In the letter Sir Herbert Ames enquired whether expectations in respect to Prince Edward Island far below any of the other provinces. With a population of say 90,000 people, even at 50 cents a head it would be \$45,000 per annum. As a matter of fact, we have not been able to realise even forty thousand, and our population is more than 90,000. The average for the Dominion this year, the letter continued, will be nearly \$1.00 per head, more than four times the amount contributed by the people of Prince Edward Island per capita. Sir Herbert Ames also asked if the Government would be willing to grant a sufficient sum to bring the contribution of this province for the year 1917 up to \$50,000.

His Lordship said that we should raise from all sources for 1917 at least \$50,000. What amount the Government might deem proper to give was a matter for its consideration, but he thought the money should be raised at all events. He suggested that party politics in Prince Edward Island should be forgotten for the present and both parties "unite and form a general caucus." "We are all engaged in an enterprise," he said, "and we must win. We must raise the money, and I throw out the suggestion whether it is not possible that they could develop some equitable scheme that would bear evenly on poor and rich alike and have a proper distribution of this fund collected through the machinery of the Government. I am aware it is unpopular to taxpayers. This is a time when we are not considering things that are popular. We are considering what we are bound to do, and I am sure the farmers of the country and the people of Charlottetown would respond. I am sure if the Government aided in the Opposition, would sink their differences on this question—and I don't see where there should be any differences—to enable the Government to realise, through its machinery, with as little expense as possible what is needed, it is the most satisfactory way of raising the Fund."

The Chief Justice also said that many of the pledges which had been made had not been redeemed, and there was no way of enforcing their redemption. If there were a Government scheme it could be enforced.
