SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

February 8

DARKNESS AND LIGHT

Lesson, Luke xi, 14, 26; 33-36.

Golden Text, Luke xi, 35. "Look therefore whether the light that is in thee be not darkness."

THE NARRATIVE

How far the bringing together of these two paragraphs is chronologically justifiable is open to question. There is, however, a connection which may be indicated by reading the paragraph omitted. That connection may thus be stated.

We have in the first paragraph of the lesson a graphic picture of the darkness of those who attributed Christ's works to Beelzebub, and sought a sign.

In the paragraph omitted from our lesson we have first of all a parenthesis in the story of the exclamation of a woman, and our Lord's reply to it; and His criticism of the evil generation which sought a sign, and His declaration that no sign would be given it but that of Jonah.

Then we come to the second paragraph of our lesson, which contains His teaching about light, which has an important bearing on the attitude of the men who attributed His works to Beelzebub.

As a matter of fact we have in our lesson, two criticisms of the enemies of the Lord, resulting from his exorcism of a demon; and His answers to both of them. The first criticism was that He cast out demons by Beelzebub, the prince of the demons. The second expresses itself in a demand for a sign. The first He answered directly, and with great solemnity and severity. Having refused the demand for a sign, He proceeded to reveal wherein their failure lay.

With regard to their declaration that He cast demons out by the prince of the demons, He first declared the absurdity of their position by showing that a kingdom divided thus against itself must be brought to desolation; and moreover challenged them as to whether their sons cast out demons by Beelzebub, declaring that if He wrought this work by the finger of God, it was a demonstration of the fact that the Kingdom of God had come to them. He then—under a figure, that of the strong man fully armed, and the

stronger than he—declared the method of His own work; solemnly reminding them that those who were not with Him were against Him, and that such as gathered not with Him, scattered.

Going still further He revealed to them the necessity for doing more than casting out demons, by the illustration of the house swept and garnished, but left tenanted.

With reference to their demands for a sign, having declared, as we have seen, that the only sign that would be given to them would be that of Jonah, which He Himself interpreted here to be that of Himself as returning from the dead to continue His work, He proceeded to show that their true need was light.

The declaration that "No man, when he hath lighted a lamp, putteth it in a cellar, neither under the bushel, but on the stand, that they which enter in may see the light," taken in close connection with His reference to the sight to be granted, undoubtedly referred to the clear shining of the light which should result from His resurrection. Now in the presence of that, their responsibility would be supreme. As to whether the shining of that light would illuminate them would depend entirely upon their eye, as to whether it was single that is, natural, sincere, true in its revelation; or whether it was evil—that is, darkened by hatred.

THE GOLDEN TEXT

The Golden Text, taken as it is from the lesson, emphasizes that which is perhaps the first responsibility of all men in the presence of Christ. "Look therefore whether the light that is in thee be not darkness." Everything depends for us upon the standpoint from which we look. That which the eye really sees, the whole man becomes. The light is clearly shining. Do we see it as it is? Do we see it as the finger of God at work, as to Beelzebub? An answer to that will discover to us whether we are in the darkness or in the light.

SURVIVORS OF LADYSMITH REACH NEW YORK

NEW YORK, January 27.—Captain George F. Carlisle and eleven of the crew of the American five-masted schooner Fresscott Palmer, recently abandoned at sea, were aboard the steamer Bermudian, which reached this port last night. The Fresscott Palmer was on her way from Norfolk, Va., to Portsmouth, N. H., with a cargo of coal, when the heavy weather which set in on January 12th, and did so much damage along the Atlantic seaboard overtook her and compelled her abandonment. Second Mate Hans Hansen was swept overboard and drowned.

Aboard the Bermudian also were two sailors of the British schooner Ladysmith, abandoned on January 17 in latitude 40.59, longitude 63.46. The survivors of the Ladysmith were picked up by the British steamer Chignecto from Halifax to Bermuda, while the American crew was rescued on January 22 by the British steamer Camoens, New York for Pernambuco. Both steamers landed the shipwrecked men at Bermuda, whence they were brought here by the Bermudian.

CURLING, Nfld., January 27.—The crew of the Gloucester fishing schooner George Campbell arrived here yesterday reporting the wreck of their vessel on Wood Islands yesterday. The Campbell was carried onto the rocks by ice, in which the schooner had been held for several days. The crew reached shore with difficulty. They said the Campbell probably would be a total loss with her cargo of frozen herring.

WILMINGTON, N. C., January 27.—The four-masted schooner Holmes Birdsall, bound with a cargo of lumber from Jacksonville to New York today was picked up off Cape Fear Bar by the revenue cutter Seminole. Advice from Southport N. C., state that the Seminole is proceeding to this port with the vessel leaking badly.
