Will Discuss Appeal For Destitute Children

Representatives of Prince Edward Island agriculture will meet at 10 o'clock this morning under the chairmanship of the Hon. W. F. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, to hear Mr. O. J. W. Shugg, Ottawa, national agricultural organizer for the Canadian Appeal for Children.

Mr. Shugg, who is representing the Canadian Federation of Agriculture and who arrived in the City yesterday afternoon, will offer to the committee his advice this morning on the best means of organizing the various agricultural and credit union organizations in the Province for the purpose of having agriculture contribute its share toward the fund for feeding and clothing Europe's destitute children.

Mr. L. P. McIsaac, extension branch, Provincial Department of Agriculture, who assisted in the preparations for the meeting, said yesterday that Canada is being asked for a contribution of ten million dollars toward the fund. Of that amount Canadian agriculture is asked to contribute \$1,500,000. Mr. McIsaac said Maritime agriculture is expected to contribute \$150,000.

The committee which will meet this morning comprises Messrs. R. C. Parent, superintendent, Dominion Experimental Station; J. J. Taylor; J. G. Denham, manager, P. E. Island Credit Union League; L. P. McIsaac; F. M. Nash, Dominion Poultry and Marketing Service; and Mrs. W. F. A. Stewart, representing the P. E. Island Women's Institutes.

Mr. B. Graham Rogers is provincial secretary-treasurer for the island campaign which will be principally devoted to the rural areas.

messes of veterans' disability pensions. The Prime Minister, it is claimed, feels that a general election this year would increase the liberal majority in Ontario, might increase it in the Maritimes, and that nothing would be lost in the West.

Anticipating Mr. King's policy, it is openly stated here that opposition leader John Bracken and his colleagues deliberately allowed widespread party "absenteeism" so as not to force an election this year in event of a defeat by vote of the House of a Government measure. The Progressive Conservatives are by no means unanimous in their desire for a general Federal election before 1949.

Until they can prove that the Government's plan for conservation of the United States dollar has failed and that employment has dropped below the danger point, political saboteurs say Bracken's cohorts will not attempt to force a nationwide election at the polls.

W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative member for Queen's declined, to voice any opinion or divulge any discussion of the election issue at the latest Progressive Conservative caucus. His record and his vote on Friday, he said, could be appraised at its true worth.

Health, authorizing the Minister to make regulations prescribing the location of wells in relation to buildings or sanitary facilities on the same or adjoining premises, etc.

Grave Danger

Some action, Dr. MacMillan said, had already been taken on the recommendations of the Legislative committee. A sanitary engineer had been appointed. He recalled that a number of years ago a typhoid epidemic had been traced to an unclean supply of milk. "We are in grave danger of another outbreak due to unclean water in the wells being drilled in these areas where it is impossible to keep them at a safe distance from their own and their neighbors' sewage."

"The people of these districts are not willing to become a part of the city because they will be subject to taxes, yet they are quite content to enjoy many of the privileges now being paid for by the people of Charlottetown. Examination of samples of water from a number of these premises proved the water unfit for drinking."

"Turning to Dr. Harold Shaw, he said, "The water is really bad, Dr. Shaw."

"Damn bad" replied Dr. Shaw. "These areas are becoming not only a menace to the people living in them, but to the people of this City. Something will have to be done."

Health Progress

Speaking generally, Dr. MacMillan said, the people of this Province had good reason to congratulate themselves on the progress made in health matters. He cited in this connection the following statement in the report of the health officer, Dr. B.C. Keating, presented at the recent annual meeting of the City Council.

performed by the unit Dr. MacMillan gave the following figures: In 1945, 11346 films were taken, in 1946, 33,559, and in 1947, 16,445. Of all the new cases found in 1947, 82 1/2% were early cases, 36% moderately advanced and 11 1/2% far advanced. The importance of these figures is realized in a classification of the deaths in the sanatorium. Only one person died who had been classified as a minimal case, 13 died classified moderately advanced on admission, while 50 died in the group classified as far advanced.
