**WRITES LOG BOOK OF PIRATE SLOOP**

Steiffel Picks Out Articles from the Dorado's Cargo and Tells Where Each Came From.

NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 29.—Otto Steiffel, a member of the "pirate" sloop Dorado's crew, who was arrested in Providence yesterday, was taken today to storeroom of the State House, where loot of the craft is on exhibition. There, taking many articles, he connected each with some theft or burglary which he said Henry A. Jackson and his companions had committed in the last two months. He revealed a long series of entries along the coast from New Jersey to Providence, all of which was written down as he told it.

**OBITUARY.**

The following is copied from "The Daily Enterprise" published in Marlboro, Mass., and dated October 11, 1905: Euphemia Edith MacLean died at the city hospital this Wednesday morning at 4.15, her end coming as a result of an attack of appendicitis. Miss MacLean was stricken with the disease eight days ago and was taken to the hospital. An operation was performed Thursday. She seemed to be doing nicely until Tuesday afternoon, when her condition became critical. She sank rapidly until death came to her relief.  
Miss MacLean was 25 years old and came to this city from her native town Canoe Cove, Prince Edward Island. Since being in Marlboro she has worked in Aspley's rubber factory, Hudson, and made many friends, who will hear of her untimely death with regret. She formerly attended the Presbyterian church, but since she lived in Marlboro has been an attendant at the Union Congregational church. She is survived by a mother and father in Prince Edward Island, two sisters, one of whom is Miss Jennie of this city and seven brothers, two of whom, Ira and Alex are residents of Marlboro.  
Private services will be held at 91 Main St., Thursday afternoon, after which the body will be taken to Prince Edward Island for interment.  
The deceased was a daughter of Alexander McLean, Canoe Cove. The body was accompanied by her brother and brother-in-law and arrived on Saturday the 14th inst.  
The funeral took place on Sabbath afternoon and was one of the largest ever seen in this community and expressions of sympathy were tendered by all to the bereaved family. The services were conducted by the Rev. Daniel MacLean. The Pall was tenderly borne by Hugh MacPhee, Neil MacNevin, Daniel MacLean, Angus MacPayden, Neil Currie and Neil MacKenzie and laid to rest in the Canoe Cove Cemetery to await the glorious resurrection morn when the mortal shall put on immortality and death shall be swallowed up in victory.  
The heartfelt thanks of the parents and family are hereby tendered to the minister of the Congregational Church, its members, nurses in the hospital, and all others who rendered assistance and acted the part of the disciple of the meek and lowly Jesus. "I was a stranger and ye took me in; naked and ye clothed me, sick and in prison and ye visited me." "Inasmuch as ye did to one of the least of these ye did it unto me."

"Yes."

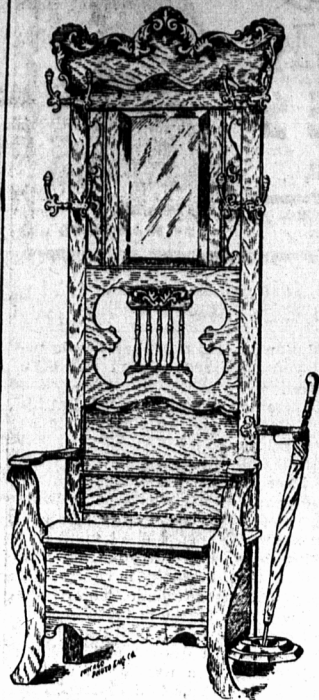
