Stresses Guiding Hand of God In Human Affairs

The following inspiring address was delivered by the Rev. Canon J. W. MacDonald at the annual meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society, Toronto, at the recent annual meeting of the P.E.I. Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

"I am very glad that the President has given me the privilege of speaking at this, the annual meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Nothing can be asked to do could give me greater pleasure because I believe that the Bible is the word of God Himself. He knows something of what the Bible has done down through the years and I am not speaking in mere form of words when I say that I appreciate very sincerely the privilege of speaking here tonight.

"Some words, which I wish to bring to your attention tonight, are the words which were used by Dr. Temple, one of the secretaries of the British and Foreign Bible Society, when speaking at a meeting held in London last month. He spoke of the 'guiding hand of God' and that is the subject on which I wish to speak to you tonight.

"First of all, let us consider the guiding hand of God in the life of an individual. Some years ago, I was asked to speak at a missionary meeting and one of the young people asked me why I spent so much time on missions. I was not a missionary. It was quite a fair question and I tried to explain that you need not be a missionary to speak on missions. I explained that every Christian is a missionary or that every Christian has a mission. I was also asked to say that many years ago I had offered myself as a missionary to be sent to far off fields, but God did not see fit to send me and I went on to work in the home. "A man whom I recall to mind and whom I was privileged to know was one of my professors at Wesley College. He was a man of God and his address was in a Chapel turned the hearts of many, the spiritual fire that came from that man's lips gave us an inspiration which shall never be shrined in our hearts. When we graduated he gave the address and in giving it, he said: "No matter where you go out into the ministry, I want you to set apart some time each morning for Bible study. Some of you will go out to mission stations but let nothing interfere with that. Study the word of God's time, that sacred trysting time with God."

Cites Personal Experience

"I was sent to the Peace River district and there I was desperately lonely and many times, I said, 'God, why did you send me here? These people are too busy, they haven't time to attend to me. When we have proved out our homesteads they said, we will listen to you, we will do what you want us to do, we will build your churches, but now we are too busy. God," I would say, "these people will not listen to me. I am just wasting my time, why did you send me here?" And so I read morning by morning, first 20 minutes then one hour and finally an hour and a half. The fascination of the Bible is so great that you do not care to leave it, you understand the fascination of a novel but the fascination of the Bible is much greater and I did not care to leave it. And then one day, in that little shack in the Peace River district, suddenly the whole place lighted up with the glory of God, a glory indescribable. God came into my heart and soul and I bowed my head and said, 'I know why you sent me here. O God, here to this lonely place away from the noise and bustle of the city, where I would have time for quiet meditation. And I think that God that he sent me here. It is in cases such as this that we find the guiding hand of God in our individual lives.

"Then let us consider the guiding hand of God in the lives of the children; for it was the Master himself while on earth that said, 'Suffer the little children to come unto me, for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven.' It was Christ that loved these little children and wanted them to come to Him, and I wonder are we bringing the children to Christ, are we giving them the opportunity of learning about Christ? I feel very strongly the need across the Dominion, that the parents feel that it should not be continued we will drop it." The Principal agreed to this and when Christmas came the parents said, 'Do not have this Bible instruction stopped in the school, for there is such an improvement in the children. Again the Ministerial Association approached the Chief Inspector and asked permission to carry on Bible instruction in another school, but the Chief Inspector refused, but the children had enough in the opening and closing of school. The Association then went to the Board of Education but they would not send the word of the Chief Inspector and turned us down. A short time after the Principal from one of these schools was in a difficult position, many of his boys and girls were having moral troubles, among these was the trouble of stealing. The Principal went to one of the Ministers and asked if he could help him. The Minister asked if he would like him to come to the school on Friday afternoons and talk to the children. He did, and the improvement was so great that the Principal in the next school who was having the same sort of trouble asked that Bible instruction be started in their school. The Chief Inspector came to the Ministerial Association and asked that Bible instruction be started in all of the schools. The man who had turned us down, almost begging to teach the Bible to the children. The result is that 798 schools in Ontario are being given Bible instruction by 832 Ministers, and 6000 children are receiving regular Bible study. I see the guiding hand of God depicted here for He wants the children to learn about Him, the only true and living God, from his book, the Bible.

"I do not know what you are doing in the way of having Bible instruction started in the schools here but I strongly urge that it be given for the children in these days when the parents and the schools give them so little. Do the guiding hand of God working in this matter.

The Bible In Wartime

"It is true that when we think of the guiding hand of God we think of the Bible and all that it stands for because it was the Book which England turned to in her darkest hour in 1940 when Nazi tyranny threatened the world. We remember the incident in Genesis when Joseph said to his brethren, 'You do evil against me but God made it unto good.' We are in these days surrounded by the forces of evil but we remember the passage 'you do evil against me but God made it unto good.' And again we think of the passage, 'God again the wrath of man to praise Him in these days.' And again in Proverbs, 'Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not unto thine own understanding.' 'St. Paul says in his second epistle to the Corinthians, 'All things work together for good to them that love God.' Thus it happens in these days as in the days of St. Paul that the word of the gospel, the Bible, is being read more than in these days of war do we see the guiding hand of God revealed very clearly. In the address of Dr. Temple, he referred to some things which he had said in making his address on Thursday of Holy Week. In this address Mr. Churchill said that he felt some guiding hand had interfered at times. At the same meeting Viscount Bennett, a Canadian, in his address said that the God of our fathers is still our God and he will give us strength.

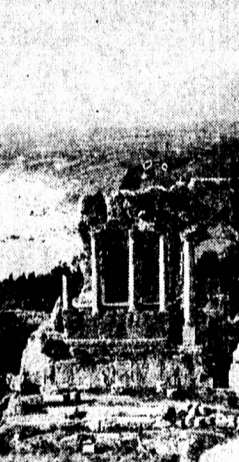
"Sir Wm. Dobbie, Governor of Malta, tells us the guiding hand of God revealed there. The Maltese people, as we know, are not celebrated for their valour but by the teaching of God's word and by their trust in Him they became the heroes of the war. Again we see the guiding hand of God at such times as this and have read their Bibles as have the prisoners in the prisons. So do not let us leave God out of our lives in these days when the guiding hand of God has been so revealed in and through the Bible. So if you want to have God in your life make the Bible yours, read it, study it, search the scriptures for by searching you find the hidden treasures and in this Book you will find the guidance for your life.

The Bible, the Book which England turned to, the Book of Canada and which must become the Book of the world. When we read of the plans for the post-war world very few realize that they are leaving God out of them, for these plans are not God's ideas but man's own. If the plans for the post-war world are to be successful we must take God into them, we must consult the word of God. Do not let us then leave God out of the plans for the post-war world but let us take his Book, the Bible, as our guidance for the new world, the world which is to be.

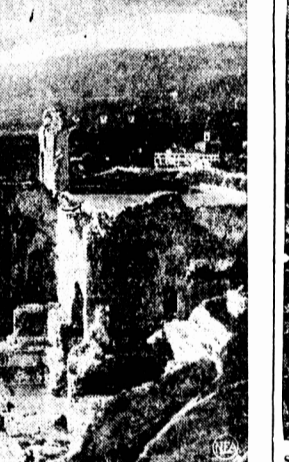

Soldier Killed Accidentally

HALIFAX, June 28 — (CP) — Accidental discharge of a Thompson sub-machine gun, or Tommy gun, in the hands of a Corporal of the Guard caused the death yesterday at nearby Eastern Pass of Rimm, Edward Doyle of Toronto, reports available to military authorities tonight indicated. Doyle was a member of a guards section that was waiting to be relieved when the Corporal in command discharged the gun in some unknown manner. Two bullets entered Doyle's chest and he died almost immediately. A military court of inquiry is investigating the fatality.

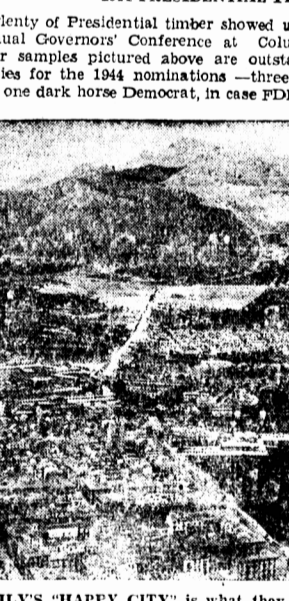

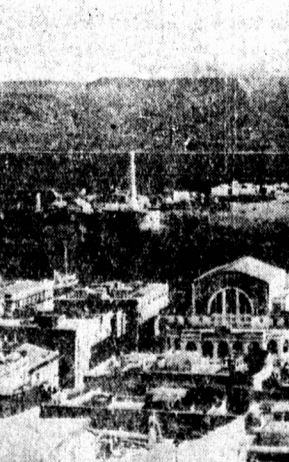
Beat Off Attack On Allied Convoy

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, June 29 — (AP) — Allied forces have beaten off four days of attacks and a succession of sea raids on allied shipping off the North African coast. The allied planes shot down six enemy aircraft while ships' guns accounted for 200 more. The photos included Britons, Americans, French and one Norwegian. A complete account of the persistent but unsuccessful enemy attacks against allied ships, which were mentioned in yesterday's communiqué, was released today by the R. A. F.
