We wish to acknowledge our esteem of your work in the church, to Mrs. Lockhart as President of the W. M. S. and to Mr. Lockhart as teacher of our Bible Training Class, and we wish to assure you that many of us have received great benefit from your work.

In the homes wherever there was sorrow or trouble, you were both there with your kindly sympathy; and many a sick room has been cheered by your presence. In the W. M. S. Mrs. Lockhart has rendered valuable services, both in our Ladies Auxiliary and in the Mission Band. We assure Mr. Lockhart that your presence will also be missed in our Missionary Society, which has received inspiration and help from your attendance and prayers.

We beg you to accept these gifts, to Mr. Lockhart from the congregation; and to Mrs. Lockhart from the members of the W. M. S. and their intrinsic value, but as an expression of our high esteem of you in your ardent labours in the cause of the Master's Kingdom.

Before coming to Montrose, Mr. Lockhart and Mrs. Lockhart were appointed on the staff of Missionaries to Demerara, B. G. but owing to Mrs. Lockhart's health they had to return to Canada, but they did not forget the people they labored amongst and each year a large box has gone forth to those "East India" children from the Auxiliary of Montrose and Elmsdale W. M. Societies. The Mission Bands of Elmsdale and Montrose have been interested by them, to pay for the education of an East Indian girl, Rebecca Kunoer. A reception was also given Rev. E. and Mrs. Lockhart in Elmsdale; by the congregation at the home of Mr. Allan Hardy on May 15th. Mr. A. Matthews, on behalf of the congregation, presented Mr. Lockhart with a well filled purse and an address. Rev. Mr. Lockhart preached his farewell sermon on May 16th, at Montrose and Elmsdale. All regret the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Lockhart who have been called to Souris, P. E. I.

Bubonic Plague
In Vera Cruz

(Dom. Press Special.)
VERA CRUZ, June 1.—Bubonic plague, previously rumored as having been discovered, has assumed alarming proportions and is spreading rapidly over Vera Cruz. Until today the authorities have not considered the plague of sufficient seriousness to take active steps but with the discovery today of a large number of new cases the city and government doctors fear the disease will get out of control and have ordered all theatres, churches and public places closed, in order to prevent communication of the disease to other cities. All railway and steamship traffic has been suspended, with the exception of the line running to Jalapa.

This question will be discussed in the House of Commons on Wednesday when the bill proposing equal rights as regards custody, authority and responsibility is introduced. As the law now stands the father alone decides where and how the child shall be brought up and what religious teaching it shall have.

FASHIONS FOR CANADIANS

The two-piece negligee or lounging costume shown in the sketch may be made of crepe de Chine, satin, or soft taffeta in any preferred color, with embroidered banding and motifs done in narrow soutache braid or heavy silk floss in a contrasting color. The bloomers may be short, as here shown, or they may be ankle length, thus giving the costume a more formal style suggestion. A narrow elastic may be let in to hold the bloomers about the ankles and the long full sleeves should have similar treatment at the wrist.

For the June bride who has not as yet completed her trousseau this sketch may offer a suggestion. It is rather difficult these days to tell a frock from a negligee, or more properly from a gown intimate. Many of these robes are suitable for wear either in the boudoir or as informal home dinner gowns, the designers having shown amazing skill in handling long lengths of materials so as to obtain graceful and unusual effects.

Crepe de Chine, Georgette and satin are the most used materials. Many of these garments are entirely untrimmed, depending for their charm on the grace of their draping.

One lovely negligee recently seen was of peach colored crepe meteor cut on almost classic lines, slipped on over the hip and draped gracefully at the hips; the drape being held in place by large brilliant buckles. Another lovely gown had a straight, sheathlike underslip of orange colored satin, with overslip of Georgette in the same shade embroidered in silver. Another one had an underslip of turquoise blue satin touched with silver, with overdrapery of black chantilly lace.

The little taffeta breakfast coats that came into high favor three seasons ago have lost none of their popularity. They are worn with ruffled petticoats of lace or taffeta.

Short breakfast jackets of accordion pleated crepe de Chine are also popular. They are frequently trimmed with lace frills at neck and sleeves.

France Declines Parleys With Russia

LONDON, June 1.—Premier Millerand informed Lloyd George today that France will not in circumstances participate in mutual discussions with Germany. Grassin, the Soviet envoy at here, as far as France is concerned, M. Millerand explained the keys will be confined solely to questions. The French government, he added, will not risk the propaganda effect which diplomatic negotiations with the Soviets would have on popular sentiment.

Turks Organize Against Adrianople

(Special to The Guardian.)
CONSTANTINOPLE, June 1.—Definite news comes from Thrace that Jaffer Tayer has organized a complete levy of 35,000 Turks to be concentrated in Kuchan Rodosto and Kirk Killisse. Under this scheme Adrianople will not be defended but burned. The Bulgars continue to come to his assistance, 10,000 being already attached to his forces. In the face of this opposition the Greeks now propose to occupy only Western Thrace up to Mambiza trusting in spite of definite warning to the contrary that the international control of the straits will compel the Allies to come to their help in dealing with the resulting chaos in Eastern Thrace. The Turkish government announce that no further steps in involving bloodshed will be taken against the Nationalists who on their side have consolidated their position near Ada Basar and are putting to death 15 prominent anti-nationalist Turks of that district.
