CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—Rev. Ewen MacDougall, B. D., will preach Sabbath 25th., at Summer-side at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Also Tuesday 27th. at Coleman at 7:30 p. m.

SPLENDID PROGRESS is being made in the work of placing the carillon of bells in the north tower of Saint Dunstan's Cathedral. Already several of the large bells have been hoisted and are now placed in position. Large numbers of interested citizens pause for a moment while passing the Cathedral to watch the work of installation. The old bell, 600 pounds in weight, with a crack from one end and a half to two feet long, worn by time and rusted with age, has sounded its last peal in the north tower of the church. The bell is dated 1849, C. S. Mears, Founders, London, England. Three years ago a crack was first noticed and from then on the sound became gradually weaker until it was deemed necessary to have it replaced. Monsignor McDonald intimated the bell would be recast and would probably be placed in the south tower to be used in emergency.

TELEPHONE MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Marshfield-Dunstaffnage Rural Telephone Co., was held in the Marshfield Hall on the 18th inst., a large number of shareholders being present. The financial report was given by the Sec'y-Treas., which showed that the expenditure for repair work on line, was over and above the receipts on hand, as all the receipts had not been paid in at the close of the year. It was on motion agreed that for the coming year one dollar of an assessment, be levied on each shareholder for the upkeep of the line. A letter was then read by the Sec'y, from the P. E. I. Telephone System stating that all long distance messages must be paid by the Secretary of each rural line, and if same was not paid monthly that we would be refused long distance messages without further notice. The shareholders thought this a most unreasonable burden placed on the Secretary of the rural lines, as the rural line had absolutely no benefit from long distance messages going through. After considerable discussion it was on motion, agreed that each shareholder pay immediately to the Secretary, one dollar and two dollars respectively in order to pay the tolls for the first six months, and also the same amount at the beginning of the next six months, this amount being based on the toll bills of each subscriber for the past year. It was also unanimously carried, that any subscriber failing to comply with the above motion would be charged one dollar extra, also refused further connections on line. The election of officers then took place, which resulted in all the old board being re-elected.

HOCKEY AT BEDEQUE
