TORONTO, Jan. 5 - (CP) - (Thursday) - The year 1938 was a difficult year but optimism that 1939 would be one of continued business recovery is expressed by Canada's public and financial leaders in the annual financial survey of the Toronto Globe and Mail, published today.

Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance, summed up the opinions of leaders in many spheres of industry when he wrote: "Remarkable resistance to adversity in business strong recuperative powers - these are the characteristics of Canadian business in 1938. We are justified in looking forward to the new year as one which should carry us further forward on the road to prosperity and deposits of gain in assets and improvement in the automobile industry, the growth of the mining industry, a check in the decline of rail revenues and other factors are pointed out in the 52-page review as indicative of a late-year pick-up in the nation's business which augurs well for 1939."

Claims Germans Behind Hitler

CHICAGO, Jan. 4 - (AP) - Dr. Colin Ross, German author and lecturer, in discussing his country's domestic and foreign policies from a Nazi viewpoint, said today that 90 to 95 per cent of the German people are with Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler. Dr. Ross spoke before an audience of the Council of Foreign Relations. Dr. Ross said no one speaks out against Hitler in Germany because anyone daring to do so would need police protection against the resentment of the German people.

Improved Business In 1939 Reflected By National Advertisers. Forty-two per cent of Canada's national advertisers believe business conditions for the New Year sufficiently promising to warrant present plans to spend more money on advertising during 1939. This estimate is based on replies received by MARKETING, Toronto's weekly newspaper for advertisers and sales executive, in reply to a questionnaire inviting advertisers representing all Canadian industries to state if they proposed to spend "more," the "same," or "less" on advertising during the coming twelve months, compared with the last year. Not surprisingly, pointing to a prosperous New Year, most advertisers spend more on advertising in 1939, but only 3 per cent will spend less. The percentage of those now planning to spend the same is 39, and 16 per cent have not yet determined their plans. In view of uncertainties in the business outlook, Canadian national advertisers expressed themselves with caution when stating present intentions regarding 1939 advertising plans, but the survey indicates that, if all factors are fairly pointing to a prosperous New Year, there will be an increase in the volume of business and a parallel increase in national advertising in practically all media during the months ahead. Replies received this year to MARKETING's annual questionnaire, constituting a survey of what awaits Canadian advertising in the New Year, were more numerous than on any previous occasion, and their summary affords an unusually representative cross-section of general business opinion at this time. loving husband and father, his widow, Margaret A. MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 4 - The gross revenues of the all inclusive Canadian National Railway system for the 10 day period ending December 31, 1938, were \$4,455,374 as compared with \$4,722,048 for the corresponding period of 1937. A decrease of \$266,674.
