Socialist Program Drawn Up By C.C.F.

(Canadian Press Staff Writer)
WINNIPEG, Aug. 22 — (CP) —
The C.C.F. had before the Cana-
dian public today a first-term
program for a Dominion Socialist
government that would put a vast
section of Canadian enterprise
under state or co-operative own-
ership.

At the party's national conven-
tion wound up Saturday night, it
completed drafting a policy that
would include socialization of
banks, railways, and the coal,
primary steel, meat-packing, farm

Record Crossing Of Cars Old Home Week Reported By C.N.R.

All Old Home Week records
for the transporting of auto-
mobiles across Northumberland
Strait were broken this year by
the Canadian National Rail-
ways with an increase of 12.8
per cent over the number of
automobiles ferried across last
year. From Tormentine to Bor-
den this year, 1,178 cars were
taken across as compared to
1,042 during 1947 Old Home
Week. From Borden to Tormentine
the number this year was 1,284 as com-
pared to 1,138 for the corre-
sponding period in August, 1947.

Expected To State Terms To Molotov

MOSCOW, Aug. 22 — (Reuters) —
The western envoys, now agreed
on a line of approach, are expected
to tell Foreign Minister Molotov
their terms tomorrow afternoon
at the Kremlin.

If Russia agrees in principle to
these as a basis, big-four talks are
likely to be speedily arranged—
probably in Paris.

Many observers here believe
that Moscow's conference, seventh
in the series which began July 31,
will be the final one, determin-
ing whether four-power talks on
the German crisis can be ar-
ranged or not.

All three western envoys had a
two-hour meeting and lunched to-
gether through Sept. 4.

Christianity, 'World's Only Salvation From Unrest'

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 22 — (AP) —
Christianity is offered as the
world's only salvation from unrest
at the opening session of the first
International Assembly of the
World Council of Churches today.

Attending the Assembly are some
1,500 delegates and other officials
representing 150 Protestant and
Orthodox Churches in 42 coun-
tries. The Assembly, meeting at
the Cathedral of Holland, will con-
tinue through Sept. 4.

Dr. John A. MacKay, president
of Princeton Theological Seminary,
Princeton, N. J., said secular
as well as religious writers have
begun to see in Christianity "the
one hope for mankind."

"When the world craves to
know the meaning of salvation,"
he said, "and when millions have
been disillusioned by devotion to

Twenty-two Victims Of Violent Deaths

(By The Canadian Press)
Twenty-two persons met vi-
olent death in Eastern Canada dur-
ing the week-end, a Canadian
Press survey showed today. Ten of
the fatalities were recorded in
Quebec, nine in Ontario and three
in Nova Scotia.

The death toll reported since
early Saturday included eight
traffic deaths and six drownings.
Four other persons died in a var-
iety of accidents, ranging from
falls to electrocution.

Two double fatalities were re-
ported.

In Three Rivers, Que., two work-
men suffere fatal burns in an
explosion Saturday at the Canadian
International Paper Company's
plant. An oil circuit breaker ex-
ploded, killing Ferdinand Hamelin,
25, and Honore Larochelle, 46,
and sending Charles - Auguste
Carter to hospital with serious
injuries.

Two men killed in an airplane
crash near Shelburne, Ont. The
plane crashed into a field.

Expelled Official May Not Leave U.S.

Republican Leaders Lose Lives In Crash

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 — (AP) —
Jacob Lomakin, Soviet Consul-
General, expelled by the United
States State Department over his
Russian refugee teacher case, has
booked passage for Europe—but
his right-hand man halted Satur-
day that he may not leave.

Passage for the disgraced Lomakin
and his family has been
booked on the liner Stockholm,
sailing next Saturday for Gote-
borg, Sweden.

But Vice-Consul Zolt I. Chepur-
nykh—replying to a newspaper
man's question—said:
"Oh, I think he's going to stay."

Reporters had asked him who
might replace Lomakin in New
York. Chepurnykh would not dis-
cuss on his statement. No word
came directly from Lomakin about
the sailing.

An attache, who said he was
secretary to the consulate, said
Lomakin's reservations were made
about two months ago, long be-
fore the school teacher case be-
gan.

"It was a routine return," the
attache said.

A spokesman for the Swedish-
American Line, operator of the
Stockholm, said Lomakin's pas-
sage was booked in Europe, adding
that there was no way of telling
here whether it was made recent-
ly or some time ago.

If Lomakin tries to buck Amer-
ican orders to leave the United
States he will be deported, offi-
cial sources at the State Depart-
ment said last night.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Oksana Kesen-
kina, the 52-year-old Russian
teacher, pawn in the diplomatic
dispute, was removed from the
critical list at hospital.

She had been described as in
"critical" condition ever since her
three-story leap from the Rus-
sian Consulate nine days ago.

One unidentified visitor brought
her a shopping bag tonight, say-
ing it was a gift. It was opened
by hospital authorities. They
found four cans of cold beer.

The beer was confiscated.

Miss Canada To Compete At Atlantic City

HUNTSVILLE, Ont., Aug. 22 —
(CP)—Miss Canada said tonight
she definitely will be a contestant
at Atlantic City in the Miss Rus-
sian contest opening Sept. 6.

Spending the week-end at Pe-
wop Point Lodge six miles from
this Muskoka district town, blonde
Betty Ferguson of Halifax smiled
"yes, my fingers are crossed," as
she spoke of her entry in the
United States show.

Miss Ferguson is the guest of F.
R. Weaver, executive director of
the Miss Canada contest at Ham-
ilton where she won the crown
Friday over 35 other contestants
from across Canada. Her parents,
Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Ferguson,
spent the week-end with friends
in London, Ont.

Miss Canada intends to leave
for New York Tuesday where she
will make radio appearances. She
said tonight she does not expect
to stg on the air but will do in-
terviews.

Asked if any offers of marriage
had followed her winning of the
beauty crown, Betty Jean, 23,
Miss Halifax, said the only one
she has "was made quite a while
ago" by a Halifax boy.

Towns Differ On Airport Question At New Glasgow

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Aug. 22 —
Trenton Town Council
Saturday advised Maritime Central
Airways that no more planes could
fly in on Pictou County's only air-
port, owned by New Glasgow, on
the grounds that a Trenton street
runs directly across the runway.

The Trenton Council has had a
watchman directing traffic across
the thoroughfare for the past month
when no planes were landing or
taking off. They withdrew their
watchman Saturday and painted
white lines across the tarmac,
laid last year by the Dominion
Government Department of Trans-
port.

New Glasgow Council, however,
notified Maritime Central, which
operates air connection from the
airport to Charlottetown, Sydney
and Halifax that they were putting
their own watchman on duty at
such hours as the air line prefers.

The airport land is situated partly
in Trenton and has been owned
by New Glasgow for a decade.

Duke Street, the thoroughfare
in question, used to run through
what is now a landing strip. Some
years ago the street was curved
around the landing strip.

When the strip was extended again
last year negotiations failed be-
tween the two towns to provide an
alternate route for Duke Street,
an approach to Trenton.

Last week New Glasgow town
employees started completing a
larger bend. It was scheduled for
completion by Wednesday.

New Glasgow Council has notified
the Transport Department and
asked that a representative investi-
gate the matter.

Taken Into Soviet Sector By Armed Men

BERLIN, Aug. 22 — (CP) —
Soviet military police today ar-
rested a United States military
government official on the
British side of the tension-ridden
Potsdammer Platz and took
him away in a jeep.

The official is Thomas Head-
en, deputy chief of the American
military government's in-
formation control division. An
eyewitness said Headen was
forced into the jeep by three
Soviet soldiers armed with
tommy-guns, and he was taken
into the Soviet sector.

Headen's wife and child were
with him at the time. Headen
was carrying a camera but was
not using it. Soviet patrols re-
cently have tried to arrest all
cameramen on sight.

The Potsdammer Platz is a
square in the heart of down-
town Berlin where the British,
American and Soviet sectors
meet.

Franz Erdmann, chief of the
Russian sector criminal in-
vestigation department, was
arrested by western sector police
this afternoon while watching
a boxing match in the Olympic
stadium here.

A British public safety officer
stated that Erdmann would be
charged with being concerned in
the kidnaping of a number of
western sector policemen a few
weeks ago.

The officer declared, however,
that the arrest was a purely Ger-
man matter and that the British
public safety branch was not con-
cerned in any way.

Apart from the arrests, the Pots-
dammer Platz is a hot spot.

outside a door of Malahide Castle
in County Dublin and was found
by Lady de Malahide.

A breeder of racing champions,
his colors were flown on race
courses throughout Ireland and
England. One of his string of
horses, Bearer Bond, won the Irish
Cesarswath in 1939.

Gales And Heavy Rain Lash Coasts Of England And Eire

LONDON, Aug. 22 — (CP) —
Gales and heavy rain scourged the
south coasts of England and Eire
Saturday night. A number of ship-
ping accidents were reported.

Three women and two children
were hurt slightly when a gust
blew a steam launch against Kew
Bridge on the Thames west of
London, knocking over the super-
structure.

A yacht capsized in a high wind
just after winning a race in the
Thames Estuary and three of the
crew had to be rescued by a speed-
boat. Another racing yacht lost
its mast against a pier.

strong southeasterly gale reached
50 miles-an-hour, the 60-foot
British motor yacht Kekonga was
overdue on a voyage to Roslare
