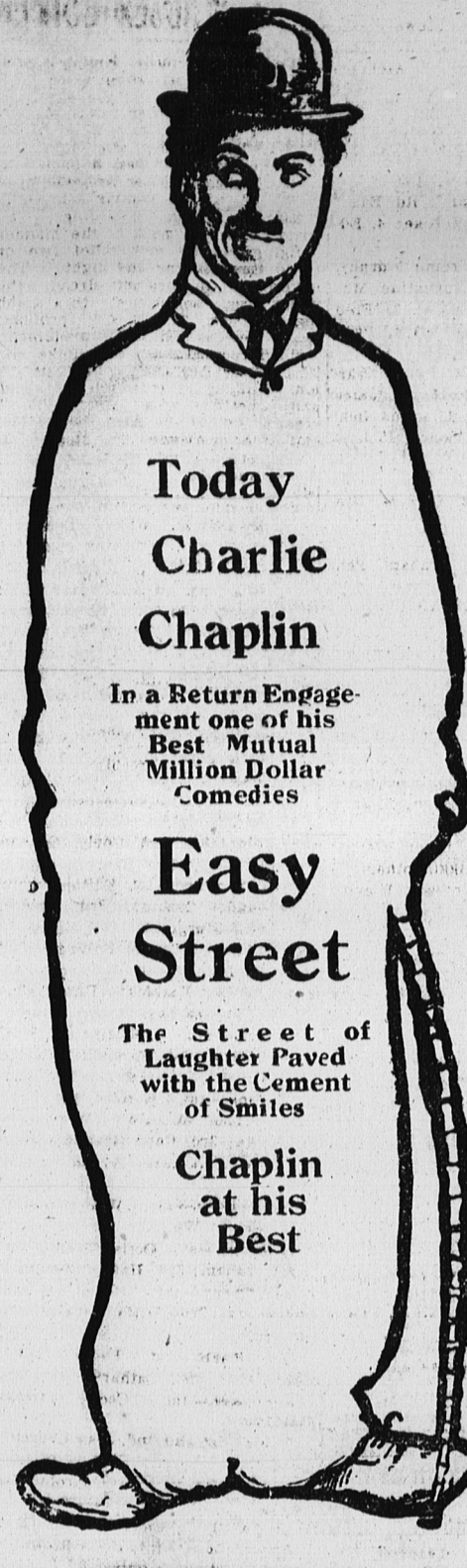

the purpose of carrying out certain objects, viz: to see that Britain maintains the control of the sea, and for the purpose of disseminating information and spreading education concerning the vital importance of naval supremacy. It was the duty of members of the League to call upon public men to take such action as would safeguard our naval interests and maritime supremacy. Other objects were the collecting of funds for the benefit of the widows and orphans of naval seamen. Women were eligible for membership as well as men, and their services on relief committees, had proved invaluable.

He urged upon the members of the Rotary Club to take an active part in the organization of the Prince Edward Island branch, and it was agreed that a meeting should be held that afternoon in the office of Mr. J. O. Hyndman for that purpose.

Mr. Percy Pope, who had been an active member of the now moribund branch here in 1911, then addressed the Rotarians. He fully realized how much depended on the younger men of the community getting together for the purpose of co-operation and sociability. It was such movements as the Rotary Club that enabled a community to take its rightful position in the forward march of the Dominion.

FRANCE FACES BIG FOOD QUESTION

PARIS, Oct. 25.—The purchase abroad and transportation of about 132,000,000 bushels of wheat and other cereals is one of the problems of France for the campaign of 1918. Four hundred thousand tons of shipping per month will be required for the transportation of supplies the country must get on the outside. The realization of this problem will be partly accomplished through the unified Allies' purchasing board.

ALREADY USING LESS FLOUR.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—Kennedy Jones, the director general of food economy of the United Kingdom, states that the consumption of flour in June was 15 per cent. less than in February, or the equivalent of a reduction of 19.33 per cent. in bread. He also informs an interviewer that it is practically certain that the country would start the cereal year in September with six or seven months' stock.
