\$25 FINE FOLLOWS ACCIDENT—Before Stipendiary Magistrate D. Edgar Shaw, K. C., on Thursday, Harold Gillispie charged with driving to the common danger on Malpeque Road last Saturday on information laid by the Provincial Police, was fined \$25. Two ladies who were in the car at the time of the accident testified that the car was travelling about fifty miles an hour on the up grade of the hill, but did not think they were going more than thirty five miles at the time of the accident. The accident occurred about seventy five yards past the newly paved highway. After leaving the new road the car jumped and zigzagged from one side of the road to the other. One of the ladies had several ribs broken and was taken to the P. E. Island Hospital as was the driver of the car. It was brought out in the evidence that the ladies warned the driver to go slower. One of the witnesses who frequently drove with Gillispie stated his usual rate of speed was between 25 and 30 miles an hour, and this was the first time she had ever seen him drive fast. The car turned over about three times. The driver was sober. Provincial Police Officer Jay and Anderson testified that they were called to the scene of the accident about 11.45 last Saturday and described the condition of the car. They thought fifty miles an hour was altogether too fast to be travelling and have perfect control of the car. The accused took the stand and on being sworn said one of the occupants said they were going too fast. He took his foot off the accelerator, he said, "the car seemed to be getting the gas from somewhere." He pressed hard on the brake (the car was equipped with four wheel brakes) before he reached the end of the paved road. The car jumped and he pulled it to the centre of the road three times before overturning. On a previous occasion the accelerator jammed. He was driving a car only since August. He intended paying the expenses of the injured lady. The Court in reviewing the case said that defendant was undoubtedly travelling too fast but he would give the defendant the benefit of a doubt, fining him the minimum of \$25.
