The name was unknown to them it had been discovered on Christmas Day was the twenty-fifth anniversary of their wedding. A beautiful oak china cabinet was presented inside of which was a beautifully engraved card with the following:—Presented to Mr. and Mrs. Fash by the George Street Baptist church and congregation, a token of esteem in honor of their wedding anniversary." It had been the purpose to present it at the Christmas Tree service on Christmas night, but the illness of Mrs. Fash prevented that. Other tokens of the kindness of the George Street people are seen every day. Pastor Fash feels that the lines have fallen unto him in a pleasant place and that he has a goodly heritage. Every department of the church's life is moving along progressively in this loyal and spiritual church.

MONEY IN AYRSHIRES.—The dispersion sale of Ayrshire and Ayshire Grade cattle held by Mr. C. H. Robertson, at Marshfield Jan 14th was a great success. Particularly worthy of notice was the price paid for Ayrshire grade cows which goes to show the popularity of the Ayrshire cow as a producer of milk and butter fat. Following are some of the prices:—At Mr. Robertson's sale, Eighteen head of which were aged two years of age, sold for the total sum of \$2,063.00. Three pure bred cows sold for \$662.00, three grade cows for \$506.00 and three grade heifers milked sold for \$342.00. The highest price paid was \$305.00 for Lady of Melrose purchased by Mr. Wm. Neil, of Bear River. This is a five year old cow that has made over \$800.00 for Mr. Robertson through sale of stock and milk produced by her in three years. If she continues to do as good work, which no doubt she will, she will prove a very profitable investment for Mr. Neil. The three highest priced grade cows were purchased by Mr. Wallace Wood, who has also purchased Mr. Robertson's farm. It is pleasing to note that all of this valuable stock was purchased by local buyers and will stay in the Province.

STMR. POWHATTAN REPORTED FILLING.—The steamer Powhattan, with four hundred passengers aboard, bound for New York to a French port, reported Sunday afternoon that she was in distress 230 miles southeast of Halifax and required immediate assistance. The message gave the Powhattan's position as latitude 41.05, longitude 62.10, and stated that she was filling, and that the engine rooms had become flooded and he pumps choked. Later messages indicate that the White Star Line Cadric and the steamer Western Comet were proceeding to the Powhattan's assistance.

SHIP WITH BOOZE REPORTED SINKING.—The British freighter Yarmouth, which left New York for Havana Saturday with a cargo of liquor, reported in radio messages that she was sinking. She gave her position as latitude 49, North longitude 74, and stated that she was twenty-nine miles northwest of light vessel No. 3. The message said forward ballast tank leaking into engine room. A heavy mist prevailed. The Yarmouth registered 725 tons.

FIRST GERMAN SHIP IN LONDON RECEIVES ATTENTION.—The Corussia, the first German ship to enter London since the war started, has arrived from Hamburg and has been the object of much curiosity.

SHIPPING NEWS

THE NOORDAM DUE IN HALIFAX

The big Dutch liner Noordam bound from Rotterdam to Halifax is reported proceeding to St. John's Nfld., or Halifax for coal.

TRAWLER LEMBERG ARRIVED IN HALIFAX WITH 162,000 POUND FISH

Making her first trip to Halifax from the Banks, the Lemberg, which was last year, added to the Nova Scotian trawler fleet by the Nova Fish Company, arrived in this port Saturday morning from the Banks. Since she commenced operating off the coast last fall, the Lemberg has been landing her catch at Port Hawkesbury, but now that the winter has set in, she will land her fish at Halifax during the cold months. The Lemberg brought 162,000 pounds of fish from the Banks on her first trip and was only a week on the Banks, Captain H. S. Hansum, her master, reported the weather fairly good, and said that the catch was a good one for the time of the season. After her cargo is landed, the Lemberg is to be on supplies and leave again for the Banks.

Larger than the Triumph, the Lemberg is fitted with all modern appliances for the prosecution of the fish industry. She was built by Cochrane and Sons, Limited, in 1914, and launched after war had been declared. Thus she was taken over by the Admiralty and saw service in the Mediterranean. After her war service she was purchased by the National Fish Company, and crossed the Atlantic last fall since then she has been fishing out of Port Hawkesbury.

Registering 275 gross and 147 net, the Lemberg is the type of trawlers used by the Grimsby fishermen. She is built of steel and is a good sea boat. As is usually found on trawlers, every inch of space is utilized, and her officers and crew, numbered 22, are afforded every comfort. She is fitted throughout by electric light, and also carries wireless.

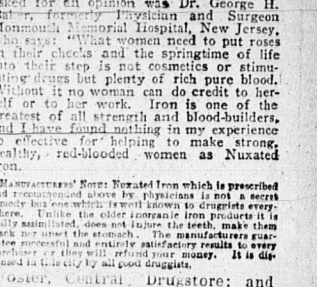
SOME PIGS NEVER DO WELL—WHAT CHECKS THEIR GROWTH?

One of the greatest known enemies of hogs is lice. This is especially true in the growing pig. A pig that is infested with the pests never does well, but is always a runt, consuming the maximum of feed and putting on the minimum of flesh and putting on the least of weight. The lice on the pig's face, we are almost certain to never try to keep lice on every hog on the place, and make a resolution never to tolerate lice again. We can catch the pig and rub axle grease on them about every fortnight, and this will keep the lice off them. For the large hogs a dipping vat is best, but vats are expensive, and not available to every farmer. For this reason, the writer uses a standard dip sprayed upon the hogs. This has to be repeated more frequently than dipping would have to be, as some of the lice are not reached. A standard dip, ready prepared for diluting with water, is best to use, and the cheapest in the long run because of its efficiency, but a kerosene emulsion may be used if you do not care to use the standard dip. The method of preparing the emulsion is to dissolve in boiling water a pound of laundry soap. It will take from a half gallon to a gallon of water to properly dissolve the soap. When this has cooked, stir into it a pint of kerosene. When this is well emulsified, pour it in 10 gallons of water making 11 gallons of the mixture. This is not very strong and is very inexpensive, so may be used freely. It will kill lice immediately, but has to be repeated rather often, as it does to kill lice on other stock, though I do not assert that it will kill ticks. I once killed all the lice on a horse by this method, and from a thin, rough-coated, hair-looking nag he soon developed into a sleek-looking animal. Crude oil may be used instead of kerosene. In using the kerosene mixture you should remember that kerosene will blister if too much is used. So keep the hogs in the shade after the emulsion is sprayed on, until all the kerosene has evaporated. In greasing the pigs I have often used a mixture of one part kerosene and one part axle grease. This will not blister unless used excessively.

In all cases care must be used to get the remedy to the spot. Lice breed in the creases behind the ears and between the legs, especially, and these parts must be reached if the remedy is to do its work—A. G.

TWO STEAMERS SEND OUT CALLS FOR ASSISTANCE

THE AFRIQUE HORROR.

PARIS, Jan. 18.—Georges Metayer of Bordeaux was the only passenger rescued of the 474 aboard the steamer Afrique when she was wrecked last Sunday in the Bay of Biscay. M. Metayer said that many others might have been saved, but that they refused to enter the boats. He described the scenes aboard the vessel when the stricken passengers prayed while many passengers took matters calmly, believing that sight of the steamer Ceylon (which was summoned to the scene by wireless on Saturday) meant safety. "The vessel listed to an angle of forty-five degrees," Mr. Metayer said "and the captain ordered the boats lowered." The passengers seemingly understanding the seriousness of the situation refused to enter them, declaring they felt safer aboard the Afrique. At no time was there any panic. The passengers remained on the steamer of their volition.

"I took my place in a boat with a number of members of the crew. For more than an hour, we could not get away from the steamer, which leaned over frightfully. Her rolling alternately drew us away and pulled us back. We picked up one of the water several members of the crew, including second officer Corce and Lt. Thibout. As to Captain Leduc, he stayed on the bridge to the end. He did his full duty, as did the twenty-three year old wireless operator who for twenty-four hours had the receiver to his ears and sent and received messages. "I am persuaded that if the passengers had not refused to enter the boats a great number might have been saved."
