DOG-FISH FOR THE TABLE

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—The Canadian fish is going to reduce the cost of living by appearing on the dinner table of the nation, probably under assumed name. Hitherto the Dog-fish has been regarded as a delicacy, but a made toward his extermination since the havoc wrought by him on the nets of fishermen, by eating great portions of the netted fish also by breaking the nets himself, he has been caught and used as bait on the farms of the low-provinces from which low estate is now to be arisen. FLOUR GOES DOWN.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 7.—Manitoba flour has declined 30 cents or 60c from the highest point. That is to say speculation has made people all over the country pay a much higher price for flour than the real market price conditions justified. The like has been true of potatoes, beans and other products. Speculation will be remembered and the price of sugar soaring until the British government intervened, and today in view of the unusual conditions, and the fact that so much of the sugar comes from the war zone the price of sugar is not nearly so high in proportion as that of products of which Canada has an abundance. It is pointed out that if the government would stop speculation in Canada prices would not soar so high.

MILLIONS OF EGGS HELD IN CHICAGO FOR HIGHER PRICES.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—City State and Federal officials, together with members of civic women's and other organizations, were working last night to find a solution for the high prices of eggs. The campaign centering on eggs, it was announced, municipal inspectors had discovered a storage about 800,000 eggs were required quantity which were tagged and marked for examination by the city chemists, while 1,000,000 eggs were held in storage houses. It is believed that not over 200,000 eggs stored in any other warehouse, the owners of which has not been located.

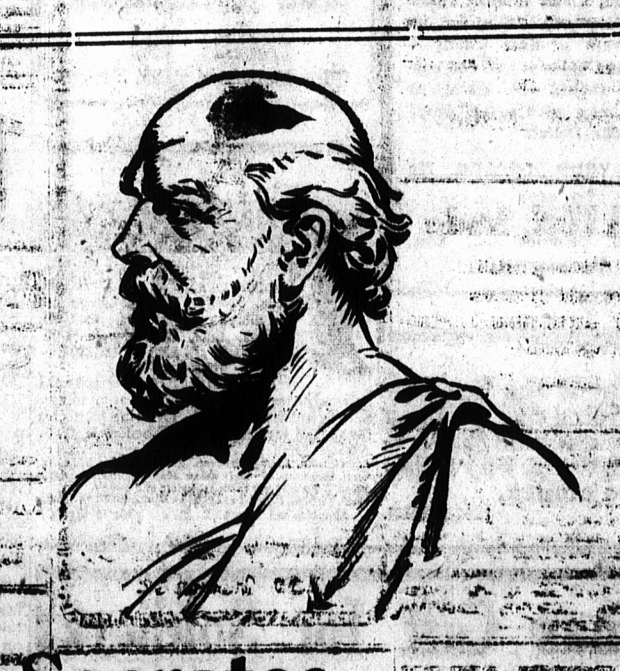
