The Markets

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Mar. 1.—The export trade in the Montreal market today was reported dull there being no firm bids in the market from foreign buyers.

The demand was also limited and the tone of the market for oats was weaker at a decline of one cent per bushel with car lots of No. 2 Canadian western in car lots quoted at 59c. No. 3 C. W. at 55c and No. 1 feed at 52c.

Owing to the weakness in the cash wheat situation and the break in prices of contract grades of 33-8 to 5-12, per bushel at Winnipeg the local flour market for spring wheat grades was weaker, and prices were reduced 20c per barrel.

The demand was restricted and the volume of business done was small. Car lots of first patents were quoted at \$8.70, second patents at \$8.20 and strong bakers at \$7.50 to \$8 per barrel.

There was no change in mill feed market today. The baled hay market continues quiet the demand being small with little jobbing work with sales of extra fresh eggs and prices for fresh eggs and firsts were reduced one cent per dozen.

Montreal egg market continues active for consumption wants fresh extras 42 to 43, firsts 37 to 38, pullets 34 to 35, seconds 31 to 32, dealers paying country shippers 44, firsts 38 to 40, firsts 33 to 34, seconds 28 to 31.

Winnipeg egg receipts show an increase for the week and the market is lower dealers quoting country shippers extras 35, firsts 30, seconds 23, obbing fresh extras 42 to 44, firsts 38, seconds 32.

Calgary receipts are good dealers paying country points extras 27, firsts 23, seconds 17.

Vancouver egg market is easy paying country points extras 30, firsts 28, jobbing fresh extras 33, firsts 31, seconds and pullets 29.

St. John, N. B. egg market steady under light receipts country dealers paying producers extras 40.
