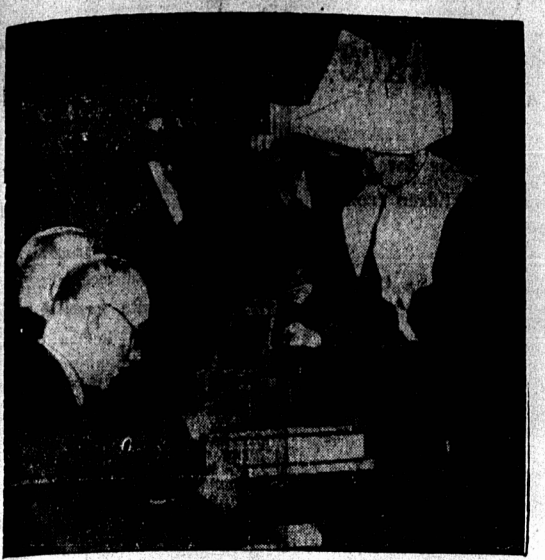


Women Voting Is News in France



Two nuns take advantage of their new political freedom in the recent Paris elections, when France for the first time in its history permitted women to cast their ballots. Final tabulation showed 14,000,000 women's votes were cast as against 9,000,000 for the men.

Esquire Wins Victory Over U. S. Post Office Dept.
(Washington, June 4)—Esquire magazine and its highly-attired Varga girls won a trumping victory over the Post Office Department today when the United States circuit court of appeals told the department to stop trying "to determine what is good for the public."

Postmaster General Frank O. Walker's suspension of Esquire's second class mailing privilege was ruled illegal and unconstitutional. The opinion written by Justice Department trustee former Justice J. Edgar Hoover, stated that the Post Office stick to carrying the mails. It expressed the hope that a Government agency will attempt to compel the standards relating to material admitted not obscene.

Justice Arnold said Mr. Walker's order if allowed to stand, would cost Esquire \$200,000 a year and probably put it out of business. He said that no doubt magazines contribute to the public welfare. "But it does not follow," he said, "that an administrative official to determine what is good for the public to read and then to force printing editors who do not follow there at a competitive disadvantage."

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NEW MEMBERS OF BRITISH INTERIM CABINET



Pictured here are important new members of the conservative interim British cabinet named by Prime Minister Churchill to serve until the elections of July 5. They are Lord Woolton, lord president of the Council; Richard A. Butler, labor; Sir Donald Somervell, home secretary; Harold MacMillan, secretary for air; and Ernest Brown, aircraft production. The predominantly conservative "caretaker" cabinet replaces the coalition government which collapsed when Laborites forced the first Parliamentary election in nearly 10 years.

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Enthusiastic Meeting Held At Glenwood
A large and enthusiastic audience gathered recently at Glenwood to hear the Progressive Conservative candidate, Col. E.H. Strong in a masterly outline of the political issues of the coming election. Col. Strong dealt with the government record of bungling in the manpower policy, accusing them of not supporting the boys in the front line with proper reinforcements. This policy only led to more hardship for those in the front line. Mr. Strong paid tribute to the large number of men who had volunteered for service from this section. He also charged that the King government could not be depended on to do justice to the soldiers when they return from overseas because, he said, they have no one with a service record in this war or the war of 1914.
