Matthews' farm an Elm tree measuring 19 1/2 feet and maintaining its size to 60 feet high—so the writer thinks this is the largest tree in the Province.

—The people of the western part of Prince County are loud in their condemnation of the train arrangements in connection with the hockey match at Summerside, on Tuesday night last. The hockey and shopping special, which had been advertised to leave Tignish at 1 p. m., did not leave there until 2.15, the delay being caused by some misunderstanding between the two hockey clubs. When it did leave it made such wretched time that it was about 8.30 when it arrived in Summerside, all the seats being then closed. The slow running of this train was attributed to the leaky condition of the engine which was hauling the train. The rink officials claim that when arrangements were made for this train that the railway officials promised to furnish a good engine, one capable of making fairly reasonable time, but instead an engine, the proper place for which to have sent her would have been to the repair shop, was sent out and delays of from twenty minutes to fifty minutes while steam was being got up was frequent during the trip from Tignish and on arrival at Summerside, troubles did not cease there. Instead of sending another engine out to take the train back this same leaky engine with the shunter to push her along was sent back with the train with the result that the train became stalled by the snow several times during the night and only reached as far as O'Leary about 7 o'clock the next morning. Conditions such as these have a decidedly bad effect on the people from the western part of the Island giving up all confidence in special to Summerside, whether they be for pleasure or business.

The latter went to Mrs. Thaxter's home and found the woman apparently dead, and soon discovered signs of life. A physician was called and Mrs. Thaxter was soon restored to consciousness. The aged woman says she fell into a sort of trance and knew the undertaker was preparing to embalm her, but was unable to speak.

WORLD'S OLDEST DENTIST.

Dr. Rufus C. Chapman, of Newcastle, who has a record of sixty-five years of active practice to his credit, is known as the oldest practicing dentist in the world. He is also said to be the first dentist in the world to use ether as an anesthetic. He also claims to be the third person in the world to realize that the external application of the drug could be used for surgical operations without fatal results to the patients. He has since administered ether for one case and another more than five thousand times without losing a case and without results that were serious. Dr. Chapman was born in the town of Nobleboro, May 22, 1822, and in spite of his advanced age is still in excellent health.
