—PURCHASE OF STAVERT PROPERTY.—The Knights of Columbus are negotiating for the purchase of the Stavert homestead property on Centre Street, Summerside, opposite the Court House. An option has been secured which expires on March 1st, when it is expected that the deal will be completed. The amount involved is understood to be in the vicinity of \$9,000. SHIPPING NEWS

SAILING SCHEDULE DRAWN UP

The Canadian Pacific Ocean Services has drawn up its schedule of sailings between Canada, Great Britain and European countries for the coming season. The St. Lawrence sailing will be the Melita, on May 15, and thereafter regularly each week to Nov. 27. The Sicilian and Pretorian will sail regularly between Montreal and Glasgow, starting May 7 to Nov. 12. The Montreal and London and the Montreal-Antwerp routes will open respectively May 7 and 8.

ARRIVED IN NEW YORK.

The Swedish steamship Sonja arrived in New York Monday from Gt. Britain. She carried 1,475 tons of ore and 3,000 rolls of newspaper.

FOUR THOUSAND CASES OF GASOLINE DESTROYED BY FIRE

While unloading cases of gasoline to lighters in the harbor of Oran, Algeria, the steamer Sabotawan caught fire. Four thousand cases of gasoline were destroyed. The Sabotawan left New York on Jan. 14 for Oran, Trieste and Mediterranean ports.

FIRE ON BRITISH STEAMER

The British steamer Tyndareus, from Seattle and Victoria, B. C., arrived in Yokohama with fire in one hold. The flames are said to be under control.

SMALLPOX ON SHIP

Several cases of smallpox among the passengers on the French steamer the Fata, which arrived in New York Monday, resulted in the ship being detained at quarantine. The steamer is from Marseilles and brought 277 cabin and 1,700 steerage passengers.

STEAMER MALDEN ASHORE

The steamer Malden, of the New England Fuel and Transportation Company, reported by wireless to New York that she was ashore off Fire Island and asked that assistance be sent immediately. No other details were given in the message. The vessel, of 3,099 tons, left Boston yesterday for Norfolk, Va.

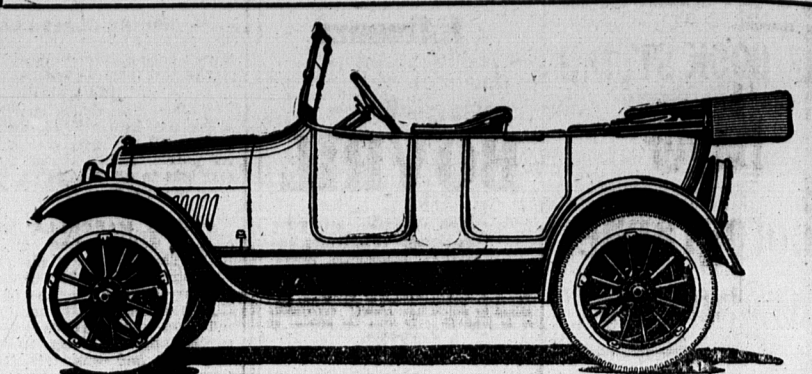
FORMER GERMAN STEAMER HELD AT BUENOS AIRES

The sailing of the former German steamship Bahia Blanca for New York, has been postponed pending the arrival of James W. R. McLeay, the new British minister to Argentina, who is bringing a communication concerning the attitude of the Allies as to the status of the steamer, whose purchase by Argentina during the war has never been recognized. The vessel has a cargo consigned to ten North American concerns who have notified the shippers that they are willing to assume the risk of possible capture of the vessel by a British or French warship.

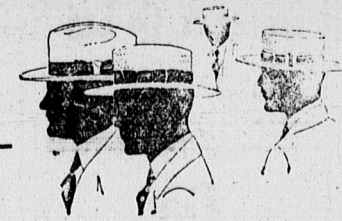
