The members of the Dominion troop, 2nd Division C. E. F., arrived in the city on the early western train last night and are registered at the Victoria Hotel.



Hundreds of Cattle Shown

AMHERST, Dec. 13.—With a larger entry list than ever before in its history, the Maritime Winter Fair opened under favorable auspices this afternoon. The attendance was not as large as usual, but those who were present were genuinely pleased and there is every indication that before the Fair closes the attendance will be fully equal to that of last year.

The proportions of the fair are indicated in the fact that there are in the exhibition more than four hundred and twenty-five head of cattle, including beef and dairy breeds, two hundred and twenty swine and more than 1,800 birds, besides more than three hundred specimens of poultry.

The uniformly fine quality of the exhibits is making the work of the judges more difficult than usual, but several classes were completed today and it is expected the heaviest part of the work will be completed tomorrow.

The short horns were the first of the cattle exhibits to be completed today and honors in this class went to John Miller, of Ashburn, Ontario, who exhibited here for the first time, and captured seven firsts and six seconds in the 14 classes, as well as carrying off the sweepstakes and the special prize for the best pure bred short-horn heifer of any age.

A. S. Etter, Amherst, also made a good showing in this class, winning two firsts, five seconds and three thirds, and the special prize for the best pure bred bull of any age.

The Vassie and Co., of Chatham, which was won by R. A. Snowball, of Chatham, last year, and J. M. Laird, of Prince Edward Island, the previous year, goes to J. R. Somple and son, of Truro, Mr. Etter this year. Other winners in this class were Alfred Johnson, of Truro, with one first, one second, two fourths and one fifth, and George B. Burchell, of Little Bras Or, with a second and a third.

In the same class, George Hooper, of Amherst, captured the largest number of prizes, with five of firsts, five five seconds, and one Amherst.
