MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.
At Pictou, and within St. Andrew's Church Hall there, on Thursday, the third day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twelve years, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met at the call of the Moderator of the Synod and was constituted with prayer by Mr. John Murray. There were present Messrs. A. J. McNeill, Moderator, T. F. Fullerton, D. B. McLeod, M. N. McLeod, J. W. McKenzie, J. H. McHattie, A. J. W. Back, A. D. McIntosh, John Hawley, R. P. Murray, John Gillis, E. J. Rattee, A. Gray, A. Craise, ministers, A. J. McPherson, T. C. James, M. W. Murchison, and Angus McPhee, elders.
Reverends Dr. J. K. Thompson and L. Beaton being present, were invited to sit and correspond.
The clerk read an extract from the records of the Presbytery of Inverness, Nova Scotia, which stated that Mr. A. Miller, Lake Ainslie, had declined the call to Caledonia Presbytery, expressed sympathy with the congregation of Caledonia and the hope that they may soon have a settled pastor.
It was moved by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. T. C. James, and carried that Mr. R. G. Strathle's term of absence from Zion Congregation, Charlottetown, be extended until the end of May next. The clerk was instructed to convey the sympathy of the court to Mr. Strathle and also to the congregation.
The question of supporting the successor of Mr. A. D. McKenzie in Demerara was deferred until the quarterly meeting in November.
Mr. Fullerton intimated that applications for aid from the Augmentation Fund on behalf of the following congregations had been granted by the committee, namely—Dundas, Murray Harbor North, Marshfield, and West River.
Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the moderator and clerk, of which public intimation was made, and this sedentary was closed with the benediction.

A detachment of Federal Cavalry responded when the alarm was sounded and prevented the escape of the prisoners. Guerrero, who was captured at Tepic, several months ago, has since been imprisoned here.

BURGLARS GET \$12,500.
JOHANNESBURG, Oct. 10.—Burglars made a haul of \$12,500 worth of jewelry by an ingeniously-planned raid on the premises of a pawnbroker according to a report from Jeppe. The premises had been used as a bank and included a strong-room. The proprietor went away for the week-end on Saturday, requesting the police to keep a special watch on the shop. On his return he found the wall of the strong-room had been broken sufficiently to admit the passage of a man and that the place had been ransacked, the floor being littered with empty jewel-cases and discarded jewelry of small value.
