It might be supposed that an important train like the Boston express could get along on time for the first twenty miles from her starting point, but at present such expectations are not being realized. If it is the fault of the boat not making connections at the Point or the P. E. I. train on the other side delaying the steamer, the people having to do with the connections should wake up. The Northumberland should have no difficulty in getting over in time to allow the Boston train to leave on time, and as the matter is of considerable importance to the travelling public as well as facilitating crossing arrangements, an effort should be made to improve the present situation.—Moncton Times.

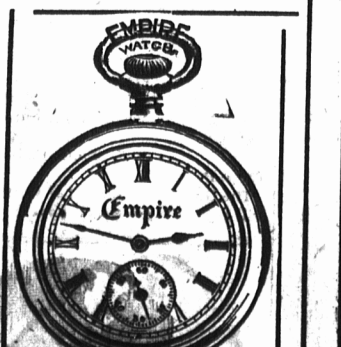

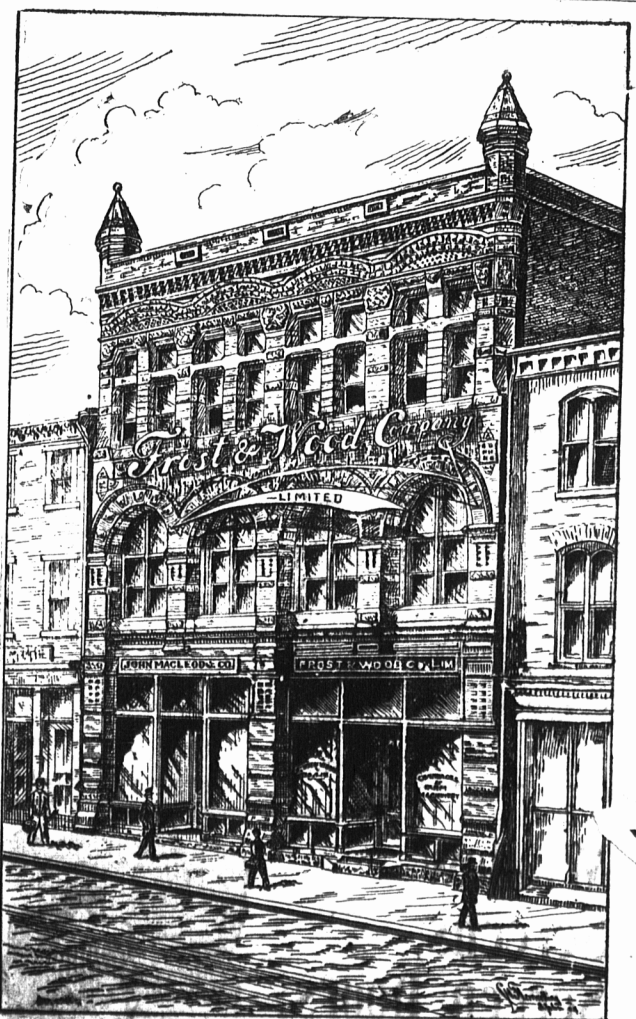
