PATRIOT'S FIGURING. A sample of the Patriot's use of figures to mislead the people is to be found in its issue of last Thursday. In large type on its front page it gives what purports to be a record of the deficits and surpluses of the respective parties during their parliamentary terms.

The Conservatives are charged with various deficits from 1912 to 1919 and a few surpluses showing a net deficit for these years of \$438,028 to the provincial debt of 1911.

Notes by the Way

On Thursday of this week the electors will decide the fate of the Bell Government. And as to the state of the finances of the Province at the present time the voters are wholly in the dark.

Half the talk of the campaign has been about surpluses, deficits and debt increases in past years. The most vital and important thing for the people to know to guide them in their voting is the condition of the public revenue, expenditure and debt down to the end of June last.

What of the deficit now? What of present overdrafts at the banks? How has the pretty boast been made good about "making ends meet" during the past six months?

The British Government, the Dominion Government, are not permitted to practise such concealment as this. Those Governments publish monthly statements of their revenues from all sources and expenditures for all purposes together with full information as to any increase or decrease in the gross and the net public debt.

These men were trusted with power and patronage four years ago. They were entrusted with the taxing power and with the public treasury. They made fair promises of strict economy and no increase of taxation.

Now they are begging their votes, men and women electors, that they may have power to do the same things and such other like things as they may choose to do for four years to come!

Show them that "still the blood is strong, the heart is Highland"—Celtic-Acadian—worthy of your ancestors and your sons. Repay these men of broken faith, these spendthrifts of your substance and teach them the needed lesson that public office is a sacred trust.

Sir,—Beaman, — not Beaman. The printer put in one letter too many in my name, so I would not notice or mention it, only it makes the name look German.

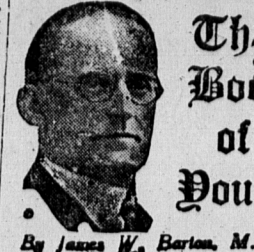
Another thought I had is no one is kicking against good roads, but most people have a reason to complain at the low rate of wages paid notwithstanding the terrible cost of the roads.
