ACTON, Ont., March 19 (CP)—Three Ontario Health Department officials have been rushed from Toronto to combat the "highly poisoned" water in this village of 3,000 persons. Dr. H. G. Joyce, medical officer of health, said today, Acton is near Guelph. "The sedimentation tanks of the tannery overflowed into the reservoir," Dr. Joyce said. "The town's water supply pumps were three feet deep in the polluted water and the sewage was all pumped back through the mains."

Naval Chaplain John Furlong is Retiring

ESQUIMALT, B. C., March 19 (CP)—Retirement of John Furlong, R.C.N., of Halifax and Vancouver, Pacific Coast Command Protestant chaplain and first Canadian naval chaplain to go on active service in 1939, will become effective shortly. It was announced tonight. Known to naval men as "Father John" or "Honest John," he established a record of more than 13 years work in the Canadian Navy before being called to active service. As pastor of St. Mark's Church in Esquimalt, he was called to the outbreak of war, he sailed on Canadian destroyers as Honorary Chaplain when the fleet sailed south for exercises. While on such duty aboard H.M.C.S. Saguenay, he conducted the first Canadian naval funeral at sea.

BOSTON, March (CP)—Donald MacKinnon, former resident of Prince Edward Island who stabbed his wife to death last Dec. 23, was sentenced to life imprisonment here after pleading guilty to second degree murder. 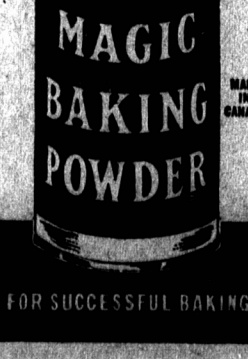

- 2c. flour, 4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 4 tsp. shortening, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 hard boiled egg, 2 tbs. milk, 2 tsp. lemon juice, 2 tsp. chopped onion, 2 tsp. chopped parsley, 2 tbs. chopped green pepper, 2 tsp. dry mustard, Salt, pepper, paprika.

Shift together first 3 ingredients. Cut in shortening. Beat egg in measuring cup add to first mixture. Roll out 1/2 inch thick on floured board. Chop hard boiled egg, mix with remaining ingredients, spread on dough. Roll up like jelly roll and bake in hot oven (400° F.) 20 minutes. Serve with cheese sauce.
