WEDDING BELLS.—Though Wednesday morning (17th) was somewhat showery and the sun hid, the bells of St. Margaret's rang merrily for the marriage ceremony of two of the popular parishioners of the parish, Mr. Ronney McPhee and Miss Elizabeth McIntyre, both members of the St. Margaret's Church Choir, the one, Mr. McPhee, assistant organist, and the other soprano, as well as popular soloist and entertainer at local concerts and entertainments.

Mr. John A. McPhee, nearby neighbor, supported the groom and Miss Mary E. Campbell, school teacher, Greenvale, old friend and associate stood by the bride. After Nuptial Mass and conclusion of the ceremony, and after having breakfasted, the nuptial party, bride and groom, bridesmaid and groomsmen, motored to Charlottetown with Mr. Chaisson as chauffeur. Only a short time was spent in the city as rain began to fall, and the party started on the return journey which they soon made, the 50 mile journey to the home of the groom, Mr. Archibald McPhee's, St. Margaret's, one of the most prominent and progressive farmers of the parish. Some two hundred invitations had been sent out for the wedding reception at the groom's home and scarcely one of the two hundred invited failed to put in an appearance. The house being large and spacious and by means of an impressive prompt cooking annex they were able to accommodate the very large crowd of guests very comfortably and without much crowding. The spacious farm kitchen was used for dining leaving the dining room and parlor free for dancing, while the spacious up-stairs was used for lounging, etc. There was thus plenty of room as the weather did not permit going outside. There was an excess of music, chiefly violin music for St. Margaret's and vicinity is the centre of the champion violinists, the groom himself, Mr. Ronney, McPhee, coming off champion in the aged class at the Charlottetown Contest for old-time violin tunes, jigs, reels and strathspeys. There was an unusually large number of substantial wedding gifts, seldom were there seen so large a number of valuable presents at recent weddings and in addition to these souvenir gifts was some \$200 in cheques and in envelopes, showing the esteem in which the bride and groom are held by their friends and acquaintances not only in the parish of St. Margaret's but for a radius of twenty or more miles. Mr. and Mrs. McPhee will reside on the farm at St. Margaret's with the father, Mr. Archibald McPhee, and carry on team work, McPhee & Son, now that there is additional help, more advanced and progressive farming than ever.

Keith Surprised At Anti-Evolutionists

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Prof. Sir Arthur Keith replied today to criticisms aroused by his statement recently before the British Association that scientific facts confirmed the Darwinian theory of man's descent from apes. Although it is a week since Prof. Keith delivered his address, echoes of the controversy

aroused have not yet died down and Prof. Keith today decided to answer the critics. "There are still, I am surprised to learn," he wrote to the Evening News, "many men and women who are convinced there is only one recent account of man's origin—that would gladly scrap Darwin and all of his works and that is one way of getting rid of all evidence which has accumulated concerning man's origin—evidence derived from the

study of man's structure, mentally, development, variational tendencies and fossil remains—but it isn't a way that commends itself to men of science. "The study of systems must be modified to fit the facts of science. If one impression more than another emerged from the sectional meetings of the British Association it was the absolute complete dominance of evolution throughout the known universe; the smallest atom and the largest star are in a state of evolution and each living thing

must evolve or die. "Can man's religion escape the universal law? I don't think it can. The Church is becoming less arrogant and scientific men less assertive. This is well illustrated in the relationship which sprang up between the Bishop of Ripon and myself during the meeting of the association. We can both trend the same path of fact together but where the path of fact ends and that of faith begins he fortunately can still go forward. We can do-

bate these things, so why should we quarrel over them?" Those you ridicule may forgive, but they never forget. And now it's the nation's turn to be up in the air about Lindy. Most men are better acquainted with faith and hope than they are with charity. Do your best for your boss or he may do without you.
