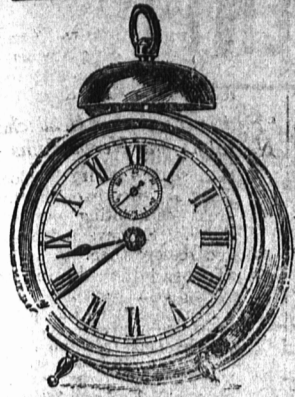

The Board of Health has authorized Drs. Johnson and Courry, superintendents of vaccination, to vaccinate free of charge, all those who are unable to pay statutory fee of 25 cents for this operation. The signalling class of the P. E. Island Light Horse squadron has been organized and the members thereof will at once get to work. It is very likely that this crack corps will soon have a first class body of signallers to further increase its efficiency. GEORGE DRAKE of Cornwall, P. E. I., leaves for British Columbia tonight via the coast, from whence he returned last December. During his vacation he has been taking a short business course in C. B. C. and before his departure was waited upon by a large number of the students and presented with an address and a handsome present. He will be accompanied as far as Winnipeg by his sister Miss Susie formerly employed with Stewart & Son of this city. W. C. COLLETT, now an architect in Boston, but formerly of Crepand, writing to a friend in this City recently says: "I had a delightful trip; went as far as San Francisco and all through the South, covering 27 states, District of Columbia, Mexico, and through the Province of Ontario, 3475 miles, stopping at all of the principal cities. We had the same car all through the trip—it was specially fitted for such trips, and had cook, porter and waiter. We found it rather warm for comfort—some days it was 90 in the shade and 125 in the sun. I was disappointed to find so little done in San Francisco since I was there last May—only a few permanent buildings erected. It looks like a city of the past." Horses and teams crossed from Pictou Island to Caribou yesterday. Thirty passengers walked ashore to Caribou yesterday. Sixty-one still on board—chiefly lumbermen without money." (Sgd) A. Finlayson. ROY HOLMAN arrived in the City yesterday, having crossed at the Capes in the morning. He was accompanied by A. E. Long and G. F. Long of this City and Neil Stewart. These four with four others were among the passengers ice-bound in the Minto since the 5th inst. On Sunday they left the steamer and walked to Caribou, over fearfully rough ice, which prevented their going in a straight line for the shore and so lengthened their trip to about ten miles of fatiguing labor. However they reached Pictou all right and worked their way through the torment, and so safely arrived on the island yesterday. They report that there is plenty of food on the Minto, and the passengers were having as good a time as could be expected in the circumstances. The gulf as far as can be seen all round the steamer is chock full of ice of all kinds, and flat and gull's staff on which the passengers used to skate, huge hammocks as big as a house, and smaller portions jammed between, and the whole mass frozen solid for miles in every direction and not a speck of open water showing. The steamer is simply helpless, and in such a much more powerful boat would be unable to get out of the pack. Before the passengers began to leave for Caribou they had been having a pleasant time on board, but when the chance of walking shore presented itself all who could do so walked. Their baggage was sent with them by a crew from the steamer who took one of the small boats fitted with umbrellas for working over the ice.
