Joseph Stalin Gives Nation Report On War

Declares Russia has no territorial ambitions; Urges army and civilians on to greater efforts; Defeat of enemy in 1942 is object.

LONDON, May 1—(Friday)—(CP)—A Russian tank brigade fighting in the Kalinin front has destroyed 168 Axis tanks and annihilated more than 14,000 officers and men in fierce fighting, it was reported today by the Moscow radio.

(By WILLIAM STEWART) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, April 30—(CP Cable)—Aircraft of the fighter command carried out seven major offensive sweeps today and during what the Air Ministry called "big scale" operations attacked targets on a 400-mile front from the Brittany coast of France to the Netherlands port of Flushing.

Grave fears are expressed in London and Chungking about the fate of both the British forces on the Irrawaddy front and the Chinese on the Sittang, west of Lashio. Shot General Stilwell's Chinese troops fail to hold the eastern Burma flank against a Japanese effort to turn westward down the railroad to Mandalay, the plight of defending forces still far south of Mandalay on both river fronts would be desperate.

By Drew Middleton (Associated Press Staff Writer) LONDON, April 30—(CP)—Voters in the industrial Midlands and west of England, breaking from established party alignments, sent two independent representatives to the House of Commons today in what observers said was a growing revolt against Britain's wartime political truce.

MOSCOW, May 1—(Friday)—(AP)—Premier Joseph Stalin in a May Day order of the day pledged that Russia has no territorial ambitions upon foreign countries and declared that the Soviet's sole aim is to liberate its lands from "the German Fascist blackguards."
