Besides a sorrowful husband she leaves to mourn five sons: Amasa of Warren, Ohio; Newton and Obadiah of Boston, Mass.; John and Averett of North Rustico and four daughters: Mrs. McKenzie of Lowell, Mass.; Mrs. Chas Home of Oyster Bed Bridge and Mrs. E. McLure and Mrs. Marton Williams of North Rustico. By a first marriage she also leaves one son J. Lemuel Arthur, contractor of San Francisco, Cal. Com.
