Commandos Defeat Toronto 5-2; Enter Finals For Allan Cup

OTTAWA, April 5.—(CP)—Two former New York Rangers, Alex Shubicky and Neil Colville, set the pace as Ottawa Commandos triumphed over Toronto R.C.A.F. 5-2 here tonight to move into the eastern Canada Allan Cup Senior Finals.

Shubicky got three goals, and Neil Colville figured in all of them besides adding a fourth himself to give Commandos a fourth straight victory in the best-of-five series. They dropped only one game.

Blizo Kampman, erstwhile Toronto Maple Leaf, was the other Ottawa defenseman. Eric Dickson in the first period, and Wally Wilson in the second, but Joe Pimonec, Toronto defenseman, scored in the third for most of the game.

Victory did not come to Commandos until the final period. The teams were tied 2-2 at the end of all three periods, but the game was open in the third. A scoring drive by Shubicky moved Commandos to the front early in the last period. They scored the game-winning goal with two more minutes left while Eddie Bush and Dickson were setting traps.

R.C.A.F. two men short, faded in the face of a furious Ottawa counter-attack. Bush had most of the game, drew three minors and a

10-minute misconduct penalty for his charging tactics. He swung at referee Leo Murray when the game was over and as Murray was leaving the ice, but the threatened free-for-all was quickly squelched.

Commandos now will meet the winner of the all-R.C.A.F. series between Ottawa and Halifax teams, fifth and deciding game of which will be played here Tuesday.

Two Ranchers Will Strengthen Dodgers Lineup

BROOKLYN, April 5.—(AP)—Dolph Camilli and Arky Vaughan, the California ranchers, are scheduled to join Brooklyn Dodgers late today and manager Leo Durocher probably couldn't be any happier to see them if each brought a suitcase filled with siren steaks.

After three weeks of training the Dodgers' attack still is as much of a puzzle as it was the day the club reported. Durocher has known all along, of course, that Camilli and Vaughan would be available and would fill two of the regular infield spots when the season opens April 21.

But their absence, even though necessary because of personal affairs, has represented a tremendous handicap to any attempt to organize the Brooklyn lineup. The late appearance of Vaughan, particularly, has kept three positions wide open.

Arky, who was a shortstop for 10 years at Pittsburgh, played third base for the Dodgers last year. Now he probably will have to move back to short, jilting the void left by Freddie Reese's enlistment in the navy. This involves second baseman Billy Herman switching to third base and depends on Albie Glossop or Alex Kampouris making good at the keystone position.

However, it is difficult to figure how all of these changes will work out when the Dodgers are playing exhibitions with the Cubs on first base and a very much faded Durocher at shortstop. Against Boston Red Sox yesterday Durocher made two errors, the Cubs' innings and finally replaced himself with Kampouris, who made another error in the sixth, to a four-run flurry in the seventh.

The Wings will be at full strength in Wednesday's contest, for Alex Muter, veteran defenseman, will be back in action after being sidelined with a shoulder separation. Syd Howe also demonstrated in last night's 4-3 victory that he is back in shape.

Manager Jack Adams, however, is to have no chances and sent a hurry call for Connie Brown and Joe Fisher from Indianapolis Caps as soon as that American hockey league team dropped the Calder Cup play-offs to Eddie Shore's Buffalo team.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 5.—(AP)—Those gusty trade winds have quit blowing, temporarily at least, in the direction of Roy Cullenbine, who is riding anchor in Cleveland, Ind., in the 10th year of his career as a professional skater. He has played with 10 different clubs in as many seasons.

Cullenbine was with three clubs last year. He played 38 games with St. Louis Browns and batted .193; then he went to Washington, where he clipped 288 in 84. New York Yankees pounced on him next in a move to strengthen their outfield for the coming world series. He swatted 364 in 21 contests for them and starred in the series as a replacement for Tom Henrich.

Last winter he went to Cleveland with catcher Buddy Rosar in exchange for Oscar Grimes and Roy Weatherly.

Scoudouc Airmen In Maritime Hoop Finals

MONCTON, N.B., April 5.—(CP)—An Air Force basketball team from No. 4 Repair Depot, Scoudouc, swept into the Maritime Senior Hoop Finals against Halifax Navy tonight by defeating the "Ack-Acks" of Saint John 48-28 in the first game of a two-game total points series for the New Brunswick title.

The Scoudouc team took the first game at Saint John recently by a 53-24 score, and won the round-off 75-72.

Following the contest officials of the Scoudouc team announced they would proceed to the second game at the New Brunswick Basketball Association on the grounds that No. 4 Repair Depot, R.C.A.F., used an ineligible player.

(Late tonight officials of the New Brunswick Amateur Basketball Association said they had received no protest from the "Ack-Acks".)

The questioned player, Harold Brown, of M.C.A. War Services center here at No. 31 Personnel Depot, P.A.C., is signed by the Scoudouc team for the playoffs after one of their players was asked to replace him.

Brown, who ranked No. 4 in the league and led his team to victory tonight with 17 points, was one of the high scorers in the Moncton and Detroit Senior Coupe League while playing with No. 31 Personnel Depot, R.A.F., before they were disbanded.

Officials of the Moncton and Detroit League have a letter from Maurice Costello, Saint John, secretary-treasurer of the N.B.A. A. stating teams are allowed two reserve players for replacements for teams engaged in playoffs.

Brown replaced Warren of No. 4 R.C.A.F. at the start of the series with Saint John.

temporarily upset present North African arrangements.

He pointed out that Pierre Buisson, Gen. Auguste Nogues and other army officials might be De Gaulle's price for agreement, still are occupying places in Girard's machinery of administration, which Gen. Eisenhower may regard as beneficial to the present phase of the campaign.

On the other hand, as the Fighting French headquarters are fighting in the name of the Lorraine Cross of the Fighting French is widely regarded as a pre-invasion effort to insure the best support of the French and the carefully built underground organization pledged to De Gaulle.

The announcement gave no indication of how long the postponement of De Gaulle's visit might be deemed desirable by Eisenhower.

De Gaulle obviously must comply with the announcement following a special session of the committee at which he presided, made it clear that the course was disappointing.

In expressing regret over the development, the French National Committee declared that prolonged delay would cause "serious disadvantages."

Only a short time before the announcement was made, a foreign diplomatic source said he believed that a momentous decision affecting the entire status of De Gaulle's part in French resistance to the Axis had been reached during recent Anglo-American conferences in Washington.

ing while two German planes were known to have been shot down by Spitfires and a number of others by the bombers. Returning pilots said the sky over the target was clear and they saw their hits register squarely.

In a surprise attack on German convoys off the Norwegian coast yesterday torpedo-carrying Beaufighters and Hampdens of the British Coastal Command sank two heavily-laden merchant ships and severely damaged a third.

This was the first official announcement that Beaufighters well known as long-range day and night fighters, were being used as torpedo bombers in the Allies' all-out aerial campaign in yesterday's action the Beaufighters swooped within 800 yards to blow up two ships.

A Stockholm dispatch from Berlin reported that panic broke out among spectators at Longchamps Racing Course near Paris yesterday when the big fleet of American bombers roared over to attack the Renault Works. The crowd was said to have rushed madly into a subway and many were reported to have been killed.

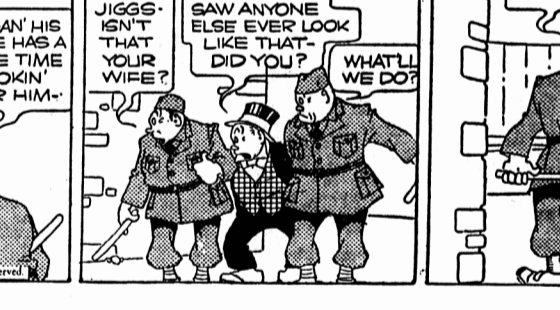

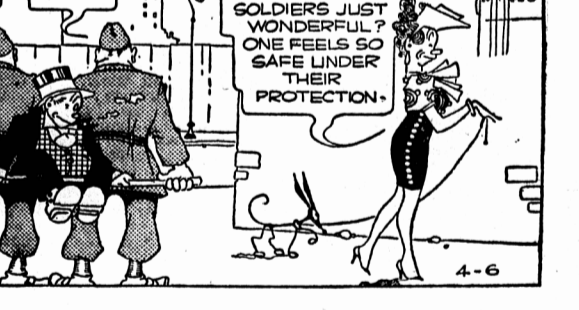
