**ALBION.**



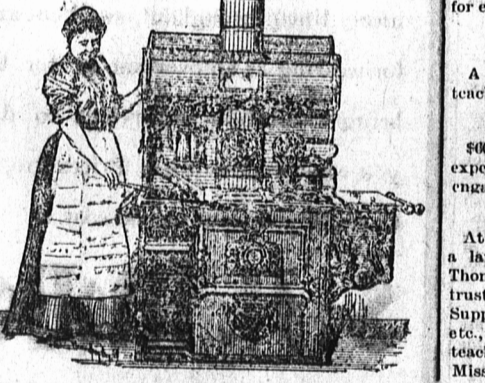
