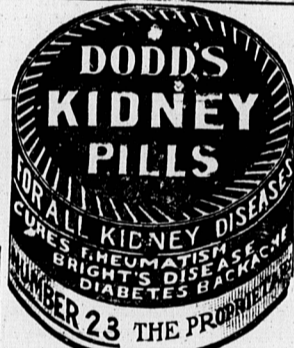

\$100,000 FOR TARIFF REFORM

LONDON, Jan 9—The recent gift of \$50,000 to Winston Spencer Churchill, president of the board of trade, from a Dundee admirer, in support of the former's free trade campaign, was capped today by a check for \$100,000 presented by R. C. Broome-Whitt of Ardross, Scotland, to A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition in the house, for use in the furtherance of tariff reform. WINNIPEG, Man., Jan 10—Timothy Dorsey, of Lucas, Ont., was instantly killed here this afternoon in a most peculiar accident. With an acquaintance he had gone to No 2 fire hall, to call on a mutual friend, who is a member of the brigade and while inspecting the hall and equipment, Dorsey fell through a man hole in the engineer's sleeping apartments and broke his neck.

COUNCILLORS' REPORT

(Continued from page one.)

We would call the attention of the Council and the Citizens generally, to the fact that during the years of 1903-04 and for some years previous, and up to the time the City commenced to lay down Concrete, the cost of Street Maintenance was something over \$8,000.00 per year. During the last five years in which we have been putting down Concrete the cost of Street Maintenance has been reduced to a little over \$6,000.00 or an average which gives a difference of \$2,000.00 yearly; which sum is sufficient to pay the interest on the money borrowed for the work. This is a matter of CONGRATULATION. The saving has been made principally in the reduced cost of wooden sidewalks. It is also a creditable showing when we take into consideration the large number of streets that have been attended to in the out-lying districts, which are now being built up with residences, and which streets were unimproved, and some not even laid out a few years ago. It is only by the strictest supervision, and the closest economy that all the requirements can be met, with the limited amount placed at the disposal of the Street Committee.

As Chairman of the Street Committee I would call the attention of the Council to the condition of the Euston Street Drain, from Wheatley's Corner to the outlet at the shore on west side. This drain is costing the City considerable every year to keep in repair and is altogether inadequate to carry off the surface water that gathers at that part of the city. Provision should be made for a permanent Sewer Drain for that Section, so as to satisfy the residents of that locality and remove a great source of complaint.

Two Catch Basins should be placed at the South End of Hillsborough Street, and connected by Concrete Sewer Pipes to the Concrete Drain running through the Railway Yard. Concrete reinforced Curbas should be provided for the Macadam Streets to take the place of the wooden ones now decaying.

The state of the Bridge at entrance to Park Roadway and end of Government Pond is in a dangerous condition, and may break down at any time. A concrete end should be built to this bridge in the near future.

The total cost of Permanent Work done up to date is \$115,929.72 and for this amount has been issued Debentures for the sum of \$1,500.00. The balance of \$42,429.72 has been paid out of returns and ordinary revenue.

This should be gratifying to the citizens generally.

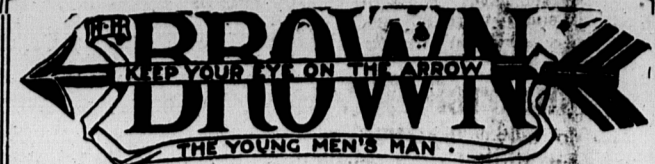
