LONDON, March 3.—A writer in T. P.'s Weekly says:—The present unrest in India reminds me of a significant speech of Brougham's in 1828, predicting the mutiny of 1857. Having denounced the costliness and delay of Indian appeals to the Privy Council in London and contrasted the evil with the reforms carried out in Ceylon, he instanced as one good result of our fair treatment of this colony that its population, previously rebellious, had in 1816 aided the Mother Country to crush a military mutiny. U. S. MISSIONARY IS EATEN BY CANNIBALS

Rev Alex. McLaughlin Dies a Victim Of The Natives Of St George Island

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—Rev. Alexander McLaughlin has been eaten by cannibals on St. George Island of the Solomon group. Mr. McLaughlin left for St. George last June and nothing was heard of him until a few months ago, when news was brought to the head station that he had met death. Sir Joseph Ward, Premier, sent the gunboat Minemoa to make an investigation. Commander Deakin could obtain no satisfaction from the native chief and bombarded his village. Chief Onehunga sent several natives with a flag truce to deliver the bones of the missionary and fifty tons of pearl shell valued at \$1,000 a ton as an indemnity.

ever come when disaffection may appeal to 70,000,000 against a few thousand strangers who have planted themselves upon the ruins of their ancient dynasties, you will find how much safer it is to have won their hearts and universally cemented their attachment by a common interest in your system, than to rely upon 150,000 Sepoy swords, of excellent temper, but in doubtful hands. In the 'Journals and Letters of the Rev. Henry Martyn,' edited by the famous Bishop Wilberforce, there occurs under date of Jan. 8, 1807, the following entry: 'Pundit was telling me to-day that there was a prophecy in their books that the English should remain one hundred years in India and that fifty years were now elapsed of that period. That there should be a great change and the English should be driven out by King's son who should be born. Telling this to a Monshee, he said that about the same time the Mussulmans expected some great events and the spread of Islamism over the earth. That this prophecy had much to do with inspiring the mutiny is suggested in the following extract from a letter written on June 3, 1857, by the Rev. F. Lacroix, one of the London Society's Indian missionaries: 'We are passing through a most critical period such as I have never seen during my thirty-six years' residence in India, which has not, I believe, been witnessed before. It is strange that at about the same time the British under Lord Clive—the Battle of Plassey, which decided the fate of the country, having been fought on June 3, 1757. There has been for many years a Brahminical prediction, current among the natives, which I have myself often heard referred to—that the British rule in India would last one hundred years. I should not be surprised that this pseudo-prophecy may have had some influence in inducing the Sepoys to revolt at the present time. A year before the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny the widow of General Torrens dreamed that she saw her daughter, Mrs. Hayes, and that daughter's husband, Captain Hayes, attacked by Sepoys; that a frightful and murderous struggle ensued in which Captain Hayes was killed. Mrs. Torrens wrote instantly to enquire that her daughter and the children should be sent away at once, and such was the intensity of her importunity that her grandchildren at least were sent home by the next boat. Mrs. Hayes, however, remained with her husband, and went through with him, a year later, all the horrors of the siege of Lucknow. During the siege Captain Hayes himself was killed, as his mother-in-law in her dream had seen him slain, after a frightful struggle with Sepoys, who put out his eyes before despatching him.

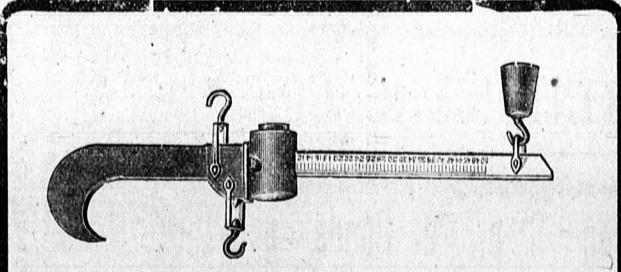
