## SOLDIERS' MONUMENT

### Committee Meet to Order Affairs

### PLANS AND ESTIMATES

### Country Subscriptions Slow—Amount now Pledged—Suggestions.

A meeting of the Patriotic Monument Committee was held Saturday afternoon in the Judges' Chambers, the Premier in chair. There were present Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Senator Ferguson, Col. F. S. Moore, L. L. Beer, P. Blake, J. E. B. McCready, C. C. Gardiner, and Percy Pope.

The Sec'y submitted a number of designs and estimates of cost which had been received by him from dealers and artists both local and foreign. One prepared by E. J. Duffy of this city was in their opinion deserving commendation, but the general sense of the committee was in favor of obtaining, if practicable, a group in bronze, of two figures representing 'Life and Death in Victory,' placed upon a low pedestal of granite. No final conclusion was reached, but the Secretary was instructed to procure reliable estimates of the cost of this particular design.

The condition of the Fund then came under consideration and the desirability of encouraging small subscriptions of ten to fifty cents was felt and it was resolved that the press be requested to make a strong appeal particularly to the country districts for such subscriptions. The following statement was handed in:

Total receipts to date, \$2212.30 of which \$2,038.96 came from Charlottetown, \$15.00 from abroad and \$158.34 from the Province generally outside of Charlottetown. The returns from the school teachers being expected within the next few days it was hoped that this latter amount would be largely increased.

With the correspondence was a letter received from Hon. Benjamin Rogers in Paris, who at the request of the Committee had visited several of the most important manufacturers and artists in Paris and obtained valuable information concerning cost of bronzes, etc.

There being no further business the Committee adjourned at the call of the Chair.

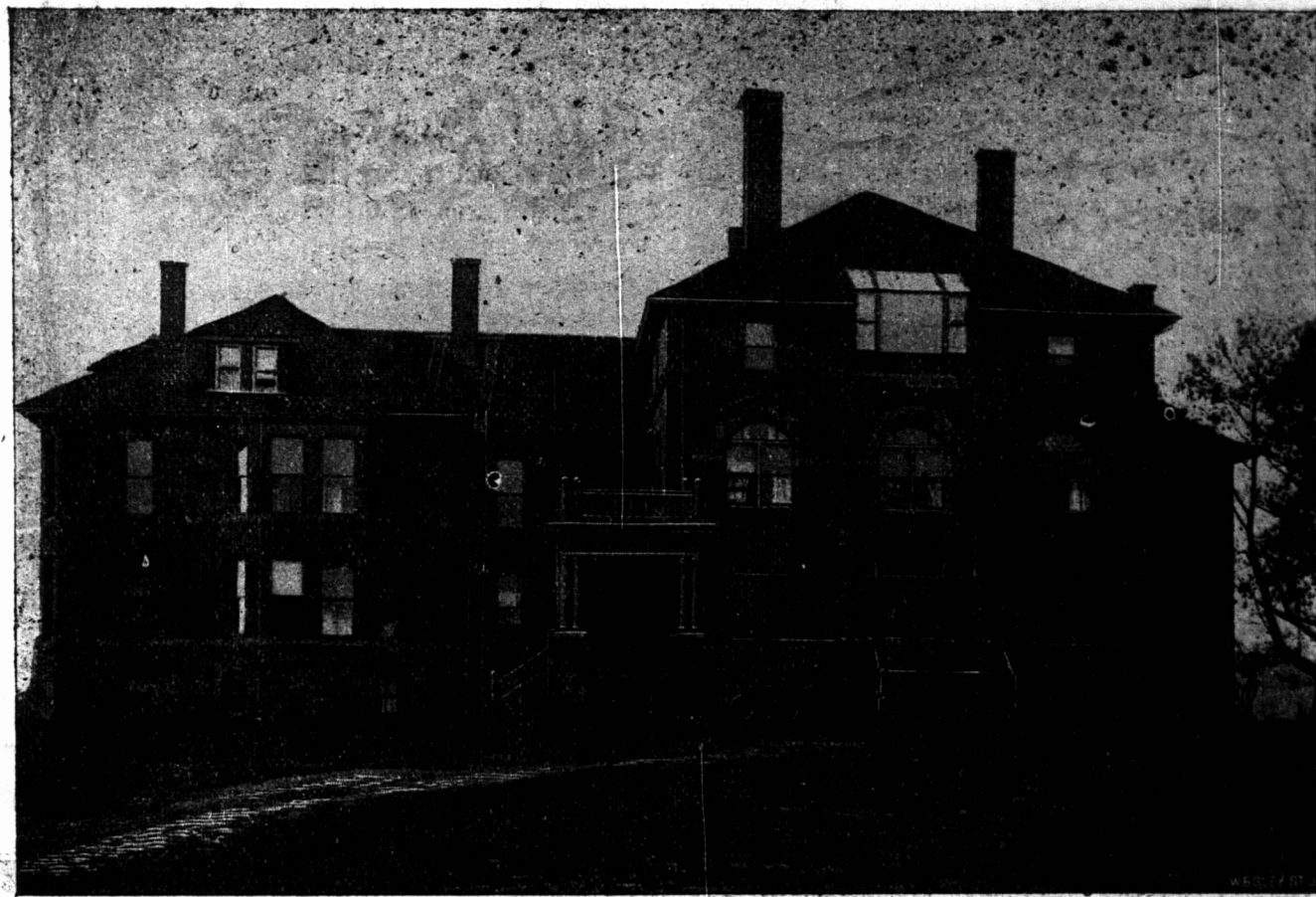
