TWO BOYS CHARGED WITH BURGLARY.

ALBERT, N. B., July 24—In the police court at Albert today, Claud B. Robertson and Freeman Collins were up charged with burglary, of entering the store of Clifford Atkinson. Collins is a boy of about 17 years while young Robertson is only about 12 years old. Robertson was caught in the store and keys that had been stolen were found in his possession by which he had gained admittance to the store. He admitted his guilt and also implicated Collins, stating that Collins had induced him to go into the store and take goods, mostly candy, jack-knives, cigarettes, etc. Robertson's statement was unsupported by any evidence, and the magistrate declined to send Collins up on his testimony but Robertson was sent up for trial and lodged in jail.

WHALES PLAY IN SHIP'S PATH

NEW YORK, July 22—North Atlantic whales in their more playful mood were viewed by the two cabin passengers on board the Czar, on the Russian-American line, which arrived from Liabu, via Halifax, yesterday morning. The Czar left Halifax on Friday and in the afternoon a school of whales was encountered. There were more than one hundred, according to Captain Smetneck, who counted them and even gave one that followed the vessel a nice little Russian name. The whales ran directly into the path of the Czar and for more than ten minutes splashed and dove about the hull, often hitting it. They were cautious enough to keep away from the propeller and not one was injured.

STRIKE RIOTS IN LONDON.

LONDON, July 24—Volleys of stones were exchanged and many men were hurt today in a fight between striking dock workers and strike breakers at the Clyde Spring Co's docks in a district of London. The strikers paraded the streets to the number of thousands, broke ranks as they passed the Clyde docks, and, rushing the gate, tried to break it down or to scale the walls. Police coming to the defenders' rescue clubbed the strikers off.

Winter, who has resigned the editorship of Georgetown, left yesterday morning, accompanied by his two sons, for Montreal en route for England where he has accepted a curacy in Gloucestershire, with the object of educating his boys. Mr. Winter has been rector of Georgetown during the past two years and has many friends who will regret his removal.

LONDON, Ont., July 24—A bull which got out of a field and tried to amuse himself by racing down the Grand Trunk tracks and charging the east bound freight No. 732 en route from the Tunnel to Toronto, wrecked the train last evening at Ingersoll, Ontario. The train was unable to stop and the engine and eight cars were thrown off the track and badly smashed up as a result of the bull getting under the wheels.

ployment of branding, be swept aside. In many other ways, which may not occur to one at this moment, The P. E. I. Fox Breeders' Association could be made of value in forwarding the general interests of the business. Ranchers, acting through the association, could, for instance, secure, at the hands of our law-makers such legislation as would be found necessary, while this would be most difficult to get, acting individually.

The first meeting of the Committee referred to takes place about the first of August, and this is an invitation to all parties interested, to send their names and addresses with any suggestion that may occur to them, to any member of the Committee without delay, so that the suggestions may be considered and the progress of the Committee's work facilitated.
