LESTER HAYDEN

On Friday, April 4th, there passed to his eternal rest one of the best-known and most highly regarded residents of Vernon River in the person of Lester Hayden. Mr. Hayden had been in failing health for some six months; but the news of his death while not entirely unexpected, came as a shock to his many friends, not only at Vernon River but throughout the province. The deceased, who, at the time of his death was in his seventieth year, was the son of James Hayden and his wife, Maria Bourke. In the family besides the late Mr. Hayden there were a brother, Seymour, who, it will be recalled, was killed some years ago by a fall from a skully, and a sister, Adele, wife of the late Judge Nell McLeod. She died last year in Vancouver.

Mr. Hayden married Christina Sutherland, who, some years ago by reason of ill-health and on the advice of her physician went to live in Alberta where, in the city of Calgary she now resides with their daughter Myrtle. There are two sons, Lee and Glen, both also living in Western Canada. These two young men saw service in the Great War in the face of the enemy, and both were wounded in the defence of their country.
