**MONTCALM CUT A  
GREAT DEAL OF ICE**

Big Impression Was Made a Few Days Ago on the Cap Rouge Ice by the Breaker.

QUEBEC, March 27. The Government steamer and ice-breaker Montcalm, came out of dock at Levis, Thursday last with her propellers repaired and commenced to attack the ice bridge at Cap Rouge with the object of breaking it up and thus aiding early spring navigation to Montreal. This formation has always stood as an obstacle to early spring navigation up the river west of Quebec and kept the lake ice from coming down the river much longer than it should. This great obstacle, however, will be removed in the future with the aid of the government ice breaker.

The Montcalm attacked the ice with vigor and caused an immense quantity of ice to give way and float down the river with the tide in the direction of the Gulf. The Montcalm is under orders to proceed to Sydney, Cape Breton, on the 15th April, and run from that port to Cape Race to signal incoming steamers, by a masked signal system, the condition of the ice in the Gulf and River St. Lawrence, which will prove a valuable aid to navigation. The Government steam cutter Constance will leave for duty in the Gulf next week.

**JAPAN THANKS  
GREAT BRITAIN**

Without Alliance Might Not Have Drawn Sword—Assistance Rendered is Acknowledged.

LONDON, March 26.—The Tokio correspondent of the Times cables:—A leading Japanese journal takes the opportunity of the Mukden victory to thank Britain in the name of Japan for the advantages conferred by her alliance with Japan. It says that, while not fearing Russian single-handed, Japan had learned from experience to apprehend the danger of European coalition, and had therefore many misgivings about drawing the sword without the alliance and assurance that Great Britain would see fair play. The assistance rendered by the alliance is now thankfully acknowledged.

**THE QUESTION  
OF RAILWAY RATES**

British Manufacturers Still Consider that United States Goods Unduly Favored.

LONDON, March 27. Franklin Saunders & Company, Limited, writing to the Canadian Associated Press, in reference to freight rates on tin plates and kindred manufactures, through Bristol channel ports and from Liverpool to Canadian ports, say they have been notified that the rates have been reduced to the same figures as last year, but in view of the keen competition from the United States, manufacturers were anxious to secure a further reduction. It seems to us that the carriers can easily meet us in this respect and still leave themselves a fair margin of profit. The rate from South Wales to Chicago, twenty-four shillings per ton; to Toronto, twenty-three shillings and sixpence; in view of the much shorter haul to Toronto, there should surely be room for a reduction to the latter point. We received to-day a letter from one of the largest buyers in Ontario to the effect that they can buy as cheaply from the United States as from us, and, considering the convenience of getting requirements in car-loads just as they need them, instead of ordering from this side and carrying large stocks, they propose purchasing from the United States goods for this season unless we can offer a sufficient inducement in price, to make it worth their while to revert to us, therefore the urgency of a further reduction in rates is plain.

**WEEDING OUT THE NAVY.**  
LONDON, March 25.—According to a Parliamentary return just issued, 155 vessels have been struck off the effective list of the navy, under the recent redistribution scheme. They comprise four battleships, six armored cruisers, 10 first class cruisers, 10 second-class cruisers, 31 third class cruisers, 11 torpedo gunboats, 16 sloop, two coal hulks, and eight miscellaneous.
